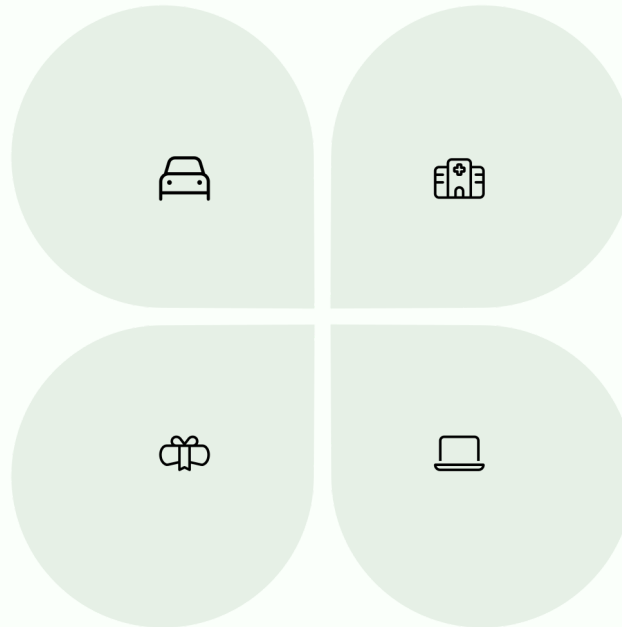

Getting Around Metro Detroit



Comprehensive Highway Network

MetroDetroit's extensive freeway system connects neighborhoods and suburbs efficiently, with major interstates I-75, I-94, and I-96 creating a hub-and-spoke pattern that makes commuting straightforward. Most suburbs are within a 30-minute drive of downtown Detroit during non-peak hours.



Emerging Public Transit

The modern QLINE streetcar connects Detroit's downtown with cultural and entertainment districts along Woodward Avenue. SMART bus service links Detroit with suburban communities, while DDOT provides transportation within city limits. Plans for expanded regional transit continue to develop.



Growing Bike-Friendly Infrastructure

Detroit and nearby communities are investing in bike lanes and greenways, with the Joe Louis Greenway project set to connect neighborhoods with 32 miles of trails. Bike-sharing programs like MoGo provide convenient short-trip options in the city center.

While a personal vehicle remains the primary transportation mode for most Metro Detroit residents, the region is gradually expanding alternative transportation options, particularly in walkable districts like downtown Detroit, Royal Oak, and Ann Arbor.
