










*About "Slash" chords (C/E):
The first letter is the chord (i.e. C chord), while the second letter is the new bass note (i.e. E). Therefore, C/E is a C chord with an E in the bass. On the ukulele, we generally ignore such instructions regarding bass notes because all our notes are rather high-pitched.
