## ■ Why Prompt Mastery Matters for Making Money Online

## ■ Seven Common Prompting Mistakes (With Fixes)

### ■ Vague Objective

Before: 'Write an email about my product.' After: 'Act as a conversion copywriter. Write a 150–180 word email that invites busy freelancers to download a free client-onboarding checklist. Tone: confident and friendly. Include one CTA.'

Why it works: role + audience + length + tone + singular CTA eliminates ambiguity.

### ■ Missing Audience

Before: 'Explain affiliate marketing.' After: 'Explain affiliate marketing to creators who have 1–3 hours weekly, using plain language and one analogy.'

Why it works: the reader context shapes vocabulary, examples, and pace.

### ■ No Format

Before: 'Give me tips.' After: 'List 5 bullet-point tips with a one-sentence example under each.'

Why it works: specifying bullets + examples produces ready-to-publish structure.

### ■ No Constraints

Before: 'Write a blog intro.' After: 'Write a 120-word blog intro introducing a 3-step framework. Avoid hype; use specific promises.'

Why it works: length and style constraints force clarity.

## ■ One Big Ask

Before: 'Write my entire course.' After: 'Outline 6 modules with 3 outcomes each. Then we'll expand Module 1.'

Why it works: chaining produces quality and prevents generic sprawl.

## ■ Ignoring Tone

Before: 'Write a product description.' After: 'Write a benefit-forward product description in a calm, premium tone; avoid exclamation marks.'

Why it works: tone instantly changes perceived value.

## ■ No Iteration Loop

Before: 'Thanks.' After: 'Give 2 stronger variants that increase curiosity and specificity; keep the best headline under 60 characters.'

Why it works: scheduled improvement produces high-performing copy.

# ■ Four Foundational Prompt Frameworks

## ■ ROLE–TASK–GOAL

Definition: assign a role, state a task, and define a measurable goal.

Example 1: 'You are a funnel strategist. Draft a 3-section landing page outline to increase trial sign-ups for a \$27 tool.'

Example 2: 'Act as a newsletter editor. Condense this 400-word draft to 180 words without losing the core argument.'

Example 3: 'Be a YouTube title specialist. Propose 10 titles under 55 characters for a beginner guide to digital offers.'

## ■ CONTEXT–FORMAT–CONSTRAINT

Definition: supply background, pick a format, and enforce limits so output is plug-and-play.

Example 1: 'Context: cold audience. Format: 3-sentence DM. Constraint: avoid jargon; add one question at the end.'

Example 2: 'Context: existing list. Format: P.S. lines only. Constraint: 4 variations; each under 20 words.'

Example 3: 'Context: product launch. Format: FAQ. Constraint: 5 Q&As; answers under 40 words.'

## ■ QUESTION–EXAMPLE–TONE

Definition: ask a clear question, show a model, and set tone expectations.

Example 1: 'How can a solopreneur repurpose a 700-word post into a 60-second script? Example: [paste].  
Tone: practical and concise.'

Example 2: 'How to reduce friction at checkout? Example: [cart flow]. Tone: analytical; cite friction points in bullets.'

## ■ ITERATION LOOP

Definition: deliberately request options and improvements to converge on a high-converting result.

Workflow: Draft → Ask for 3 variants → Select one → Ask for micro-edits on clarity and credibility → Final polish.

## ■ Monetization Use Cases (Built for Online Income)

### ■ Affiliate Offers

'Act as an affiliate copywriter. Write 3 bullet benefits that contrast time saved vs. money earned. Use numbers where possible.'

'Draft a bridge-page intro that reframes skepticism and introduces a simple next step.'

### ■ Email Sequences

'Write a 5-day warm-up sequence: Day 1 value, Day 2 story, Day 3 insight, Day 4 case proof, Day 5 offer.'

'Convert Day 3 into a 2-minute video script with the same arc.'

### ■ Content Engines

'Generate a weekly content map: 1 pillar post → 3 clips → 5 captions → 2 email angles.'

'Turn objections into content: list 7 objections and write 7 micro-responses (under 30 words).'

### ■ Offer Pages

'Outline a results-first sales page: promise, proof, process, plan (pricing), and push (CTA).'

'Create 5 guarantee lines that reduce purchase anxiety without sounding hypey.'

## ■ Automation Workflows That Save Hours Weekly

Content Batching: 'List 10 headlines → select 3 → produce 3 outlines → write 3 intros → convert to 3 scripts.'  
Run this on Mondays.

Repurposing Machine: 'From one blog: create 2 carousels, 2 Shorts scripts, 1 email intro, 3 tweet hooks.'

Research Sprints: 'Summarize top-5 trends, list sources, extract quotes, generate a 150-word synthesis.'

Offer Optimization: 'Rewrite benefits → add proof snippets → add risk reversal → create 2 CTA variants.'

## ■ Conversion Psychology Prompts

'Write a social proof block using 3 short quotes and 1 outcome statistic.'

'Compose a scarcity section that feels ethical and time-bound; avoid pressure tactics.'

'Create 5 CTA lines that blend emotion and specificity; 5–8 words each.'

'Draft a price-anchoring paragraph comparing monthly cost to a common expense.'

## ■ Advanced Prompt Chaining (Worked Examples)

Chain A – Lead Magnet to Email: Outline → Write intro → Create CTA → Convert to email → Create subject lines.

Chain B – Video Production: Topic list → Pick angle → Hook options → 60-second script → Caption + hashtags.

Chain C – Sales Page Micro-Blocks: Promise → Proof → Objection → Reframe → CTA microcopy.

## ■ A/B Testing with Prompts

Variation Strategy: Ask for 5 headline variants that differ by curiosity, specificity, and time-bound promise.

Selection Rule: Choose the variant that is clearest first; clever second.

Measurement: Track CTR, time on page, and reply rate. Keep a prompt log of what wins.

### ■ Lead Gen

Write a 120-word opt-in page intro for a checklist that saves creators 3 hours/week.

### ■ Follow-Up

Write a 3-email reminder series: T-48h, T-24h, T-4h with soft urgency.

Produce 5 P.S. lines that add specificity without hype.

Case 1 – From Generic to Specific: Switching from 'Write a blog' to ROLE–TASK–GOAL cut revisions by 60% and doubled publish speed.

Case 2 – Repurposing Payoff: Weekly chaining created 12 posts from one pillar, raising list growth by 22% in a month.

Case 3 – Offer Clarity: Adding proof and risk-reversal blocks increased checkout completion by 11%.
