

Small Group Starter Resource Guide

Inspired by St. Eugene de Mazenod and the Oblate Charism

1. Introduction: Why Small Groups Matter

- St. Eugene began his mission by gathering a small group of young people in Aix-en-Provence, focusing on their dignity and call to holiness.
- Small groups create space for belonging, formation, and missionary zeal—all central to the Oblate charism.
- This guide will help parish leaders start or strengthen youth and young adult small groups using simple, repeatable steps.





2. The Oblate Charism in Small Groups

Quote from St. Eugene:"We must lead young people to understand who they are in the eyes of God."

- Closeness to the poor & abandoned: Small groups allow leaders to walk personally with those who may feel overlooked in the parish.
- Formation of saints: St.
 Eugene's vision was that young people could become saints by encountering Christ together.
- Missionary community: Small groups become seeds of missionary discipleship, equipping young people to evangelize their peers.

3. Getting Started: Step-by-Step

- 1. Pray & Discern Ask the Holy Spirit who you should invite first.
- 2. **Invite Personally** Like Eugene gathering youth in his home, start small and invite directly.
- 3. **Choose a Simple Structure** Begin with prayer, Scripture, sharing, and one practical takeaway.
- 4. **Meet Consistently** Weekly or bi-weekly meetings create momentum.
- 5. **Empower Leaders** Rotate leadership to grow ownership and responsibility.






4. Sample Meeting Structure

- Opening Prayer (5 min) Drawn from Oblate prayers or spontaneous.
- Scripture Reading (10 min) –
 Focused on the Gospel or upcoming Sunday readings.
- Sharing & Discussion (20–30 min) "What struck you? Where do you see God in this?"
- Mission Step (10 min) One small action to live faith during the week.
- Closing Prayer (5 min) Include intercessions for parish needs.



5. Practical Tips for Success

- **Keep it relational:** Small groups are about friendship in Christ, not programs.
- Start small, dream big: Even 3–4 committed youth can ignite a parish movement.
- Stay connected: Link back to the parish and pastor for support.
- Lean into the 5 Levels Framework: This guide helps parishes move from Level 1 (Interest) to Level 2 (Community Building).
