- **Darknet Marketplaces:** High risk. Counterfeits, scams, and law enforcement stings are common.



Section 3: Barter & Local Alternatives

In a collapse, barter may become more common than cash:

- **High-value barter items:** Antibiotics, painkillers, insulin, inhalers.
- **Safer exchanges:** Trading herbal remedies, OTC meds, or homegrown tinctures.
- **Barter networks:** Church groups, homesteaders, prepper communities often create underground trade webs.





Section 4: Risks & Red Flags

The black market is dangerous. Watch out for:

- **Counterfeit pills** (may contain chalk, fentanyl, or wrong dosage).
- **Expired or degraded meds** (especially insulin and antibiotics).
