7 Tricks That Make Any Photo Look Better

These seven techniques cover the most impactful adjustments you can make to any image. Follow the workflows exactly and you'll see professional results every time.

1 Fix Lighting Safely

Always duplicate your layer before touching anything. Nudge brightness up in small steps to avoid a washed-out mess. Only add contrast if the photo looks flat and lifeless.

Workflow: Ctrl/Cmd + J → Image → Adjustments → Brightness/Contrast or Levels → Drag sliders slowly until natural.

2 Add Subtle Sharpness

Target Amount 50–80%, Radius 0.5–1.0, Threshold 3–5. Zoom to 100% and inspect edges. If white halos form, you've gone too far. Sharpen the subject only — leave backgrounds alone.

Workflow: Duplicate layer → Filter → Sharpen → Unsharp Mask → Input settings → Inspect at 100% zoom.

3 Boost Lifeless Colors

Vibrance to +15 and Saturation to +10 is usually all you need. Target specific dull colors individually instead of boosting everything at once. If it looks like a cartoon, dial it back.

Workflow: Duplicate layer → Image → Adjustments → Vibrance (+15) → Saturation (+10) → Use dropdown channel if needed.

4 Crop for Stronger Composition

Turn on the Rule of Thirds grid and crop out anything that doesn't add value. Dead space is the enemy. A tighter crop makes a photo feel intentional.

Workflow: Press C → Enable Rule of Thirds grid → Drag handles until subject sits on an intersection → Press Enter.

5 Straighten Crooked Horizons

Draw a line along any edge that should be perfectly horizontal and let the software do the rest. Crooked horizons ruin good shots.

Workflow: Press C → Click Straighten icon → Draw line along tilted horizon → Software rotates automatically → Enter.

6 Clean Up Noise & Grain

Use Strength 6–8 and Color Noise Reduction 50–70%. Zoom to 100% first — judging grain on a small screen view is useless. Clean low-light grain in dark areas.

Workflow: Duplicate layer → Zoom to 100% → Filter → Noise → Reduce Noise → Set sliders → Click OK.

7 Remove Background Distractions

Sample a clean patch nearby, then paint over whatever is bothering you. For larger areas, use the Clone Stamp tool. Zoom out frequently to make sure it blends.

Workflow: Duplicate layer → Press J → Hold Alt/Opt and click clean area to sample → Paint over distraction.

Critical Mistakes & Essential Workflow Habits

5 Critical Mistakes to Stop Making

Cruel Over-Sharpening

Crunchy edges and white halos are bad signs. Keep Amount under 100%. Use a layer mask to limit sharpening to important spots like eyes or edges only.

Blown Highlights

Once highlights are clipped, that detail is gone forever. Watch your histogram and pull back exposure before data stacks against the right wall.

Eye-Searing Over-Saturation

Going past +30 makes things look fake. Use Vibrance instead — it naturally protects skin tones. Step away for fresh eyes before final saving.

Not Checking Zoom Levels

One zoom level is never enough. Check edits close-up at 100%, then step back to fit-screen to judge the overall feeling. Both viewpoints matter.

Stacking Too Many Adjustments.

Five adjustment layers is usually the limit before an image looks overdone. Lower the opacity on your adjustments to let them breathe naturally together.

4 Essential Workflow Habits



Duplicate First

Do this every single time before editing pixels. Rename it "Working Copy" and leave your original hidden at the bottom. Future you will thank you.



Always Use Adjustment Layers

Editing directly on your base pixel layer paints you into a corner. Adjustment layers sit non-destructively on top and can be tweaked or deleted anytime.



The 3-Check Rule

Before exporting: toggle edit layers on/off to compare, look at full composition at fit-screen, and zoom to 100% to check pixels. All three, every time.



Save Smart

Save your master PSD first to keep every layer intact. Then export a flat copy — JPG for photos (quality 80–90) or PNG for transparency.

 Always work non-destructively. Duplicate layers, use adjustment layers, and save your master PSD before exporting. These three habits alone will save you hours of frustration.
