Understanding basic cruise terms can enhance your cruise experience and help you navigate the ship like a pro. From the bow to the stern and everything in between, here's a quick guide to the essential lingo you'll encounter on your voyage.

- **Starboard Side:** The right side of the ship when facing forward.
- **Port Side:** The left side of the ship when facing forward. Note that despite the name, cruise ships frequently dock on their starboard side. The docking orientation depends on port layout and operational factors like weather, harbor traffic, fueling, and loading supplies.
- **Midship:** The middle section of the ship.
- **Bow (Forward):** The front of the ship.
- **Stern (Aft):** The back of the ship.
- **Deck:** A floor or level on the ship.
- **Beam:** The width of the ship at its widest point.
- **Hull:** The main body of the ship that sits in the water.

- **Keel:** The central structural base of the ship running along the bottom.
- **Bridge:** The place where the captain and officers navigate the ship.
- **Helm:** The designated station on the bridge for controlling the ship's steering and navigation.
- **Draft:** The depth of the ship below the waterline.
- **Moor:** To secure the ship with ropes or anchors.
- **Berth:** A ship's parking spot at a dock or a passenger's sleeping area.
- **Buoy:** A floating marker in the water for navigation or mooring.
- **I-95:** On many cruise ships, 'I-95' is the nickname for the primary corridor used by crew members, connecting crew cabins, dining areas, and service zones. Efficient movement along the I-95 helps keep ship operations running smoothly behind the scenes.
- **Gangway:** The ramp or staircase used to board and exit the ship.
- **Nautical Mile:** A unit of distance used in maritime navigation. One nautical mile equals 1.15 land miles (1.85 kilometers).
- **Knot:** A unit of speed equal to one nautical mile per hour. One knot is equivalent to 1.15 miles (1.85 kilometers) per hour.
- **Latitude:** The distance north or south of the equator, measured in degrees.
- **Longitude:** The distance east or west of the prime meridian, measured in degrees.
- **Wake:** The trail of disturbed water left behind a ship as it travels forward.
- **Crossing:** A long-distance voyage where the ship relocates from one region to another, typically between seasons. Examples include transatlantic and transpacific crossings. The difference between a crossing and the previously mentioned

repositioning cruise is that the crossing is usually non-stop or minimal-stop, and a repositioning cruise typically offers a mix of sea days and port visits.

- **Departure/Embarkation port:** The initial port where passengers board the ship.
- **Embarkation:** The process of passengers boarding the ship at the start of their voyage, usually at the departure port.
- **Disembarkation:** The process of passengers leaving the ship at the end of the voyage.
- **Port-of-Call:** A destination or stop on the cruise itinerary.
- **International Waters:** Once a cruise ship sails more than 12 nautical miles from a country's coastline, it enters international waters, where different maritime laws and regulations apply than in territorial waters.
- **Shore Excursions:** Organized tours and activities available to passengers while the ship is in port.
- **Sea Day:** A day spent entirely at sea without port stops.
- **Dock:** A fixed or floating structure where a cruise ship ties up to embark and disembark passengers and load supplies.
- **Tender:** A small boat used to transport passengers to shore and back to the ship when the vessel can't dock.
- **Porthole:** A small, round window on a ship.
- **Veranda:** A private balcony attached to a cabin.
- **Atrium:** The central hub of the ship, often spanning multiple decks, with guest services desk, shops, and cafés.
- **Promenade:** An open deck that wraps around the ship, typically used for walking or jogging.
- **Lido Deck:** The main pool and outdoor activity area on the ship, usually featuring a buffet, bar, and café.
- **Main Dining Room:** The primary restaurant on the ship.
- **Fixed Seating:** Assigned dining times in the main dining room.
- **Open Seating:** Flexible dining times in the main dining room.

- **Specialty Restaurant:** A premium dining venue offering gourmet cuisine like steakhouses, sushi, or Italian for an additional fee.
- **Buffet:** A casual dining area offering various self-serve international dishes.
- **Galley:** A ship's kitchen.
- **Corkage Fees:** Charges cruise ships apply when you bring your own wine or champagne into dining areas or bars.
- **Aboard/Onboard:** Being on the ship.
- **Back-to-Back Cruises:** Booking consecutive cruises on the same ship.
- **Passenger Space Ratio:** The ship's gross tonnage divided by its maximum passenger capacity determines the average space per guest, indicating onboard spaciousness and comfort.
- **Passenger to Crew Ratio:** The number of passengers per crew member, usually reflecting service quality.
- **Cabin/Stateroom:** A passenger's room on the ship.
- **Pullman Bed:** A fold-down bed from walls or ceilings.
- **Quad:** A cabin designed to accommodate four passengers.
- **Single Occupancy:** A cabin designated for individual travelers.
- **(E)Muster:** A safety drill or digital safety briefing on the ship that passengers must complete before sailing.
- **Muster Station:** The designated area for passengers during emergencies.
- **Cabin Attendant:** The crew member responsible for cleaning and maintaining passengers' cabins.
- **Master:** The ship's captain.
- **Maitre d':** The head of the waitstaff, responsible for managing restaurant service.
- **Cruise Card:** A multi-purpose card that serves as your cabin key, onboard payment method, and ID during the cruise. Note that an increasing number of cruise lines are replacing cruise

cards with chips that can be attached to neck straps, lanyards, or wristbands.

- **Cruise to Nowhere:** A short cruise that returns to the same port without stops.
- **Freestyle Cruising:** A flexible concept with no fixed dining schedules and dress codes.
- **Shoulder Season:** The period just before and after peak season, offering milder weather, fewer crowds, and lower cruise fares.
- **Formal Night:** An evening where passengers dress up for dinner and events.
- **Friends of Bill:** A meeting for passengers who are members of Alcoholics Anonymous, offering a space for mutual support.
- **Friends of Dorothy:** A gathering for LGBTQ+ passengers.
- **Fleet:** All the ships owned by a cruise line.
- **Sister Ships:** Ships of the same class or design within a fleet.
- **Maiden Voyage:** A ship's first official cruise.
- **Maiden Call:** The inaugural visit of a cruise ship to a particular port, often celebrated with special events or ceremonies.
- **Cruise Contract:** The legal agreement between a passenger and cruise line.

Non-refundable deposits are cheaper, but you lose the money upon cancellation. If you cancel early, some cruise lines may give you partial future cruise credit (like 75 to 90 percent of the deposit). Always check deadlines, as many non-refundable deposits become permanent 7 to 30 days after booking. Note that cruise lines often offer lower deposits as part of their promotions, and travel agents can sometimes secure reduced deposits as well.

9. Research Ports of Call

This is an essential step before booking a cruise. Check for visa requirements, public holidays (which may close attractions or offer unique festivals), the distance from the cruise terminal to downtown,

11. Avoid Rooms Near Elevators and Stairs, Late-Night Venues, Anchors, or Under Pool Decks

Rooms in these areas can be noisy due to foot traffic, music, or mechanical sounds, which may disrupt your sleep and relaxation. For a peaceful cruise, choose a quieter location away from high-traffic zones. To keep it simple, choose a cabin surrounded by other cabins on all sides—left, right, above, below, and opposite yours. Always verify this on the deck plans before booking. Be aware that booking a 'guarantee' cabin can sometimes place you in noisy areas, so consider this risk carefully. If the cruise line has already assigned you a loud cabin, politely request a transfer, though availability depends on ship occupancy.

12. Avoid Rooms with Obstructed Views

Avoid rooms that have lifeboats, poles, or railings blocking your view. Just like noisy cabins, booking a 'guarantee' cabin may result in being assigned a room with an obstructed view. If an unobstructed view is important to you, select your specific cabin rather than choosing a

'guarantee' one. Again, if the cruise line has already assigned you a cabin with an obstructed view, politely request a transfer.

13. Port Side or Starboard Side

When booking an oceanview cabin or higher, review your cruise itinerary on a map to identify coastal views. Choose the port or starboard side based on which will face land. This strategy works best for itineraries with extended coastline views, such as those along Alaska or Norway's fjords.

14. Booking Interconnecting Cabins

These cabins are ideal for families, offering parents privacy while keeping their children close by. They also provide extra space, convenience, and peace of mind, making your cruise more comfortable and enjoyable for everyone. However, booking interconnecting rooms can lead to noise, reduced privacy, and unwanted neighbors if you're not traveling with a family.

You'll still have access to the open decks and lounges with ocean views, and you can always switch your TV to the bridge camera channel for a virtual window to the outside. This 24/7 live feed lets you check the weather, sea conditions, and port arrivals without leaving your room.

Some cruise ships have interior cabins with virtual balconies, where an entire wall displays a projected balcony view, offering the feel of an ocean view without the actual balcony.

Book shore excursions, drink packages, spa treatments, specialty dining, and Wi-Fi packages before your trip. Pre-booking add-ons can

save money, ensure availability, and provide a smooth, stress-free experience once you're on board. If you haven't pre-booked add-ons, do so as soon as you embark on the ship.

If you want to board the ship early but aren't staying in a suite and you are not a high-tier member of the cruise line's loyalty program, you can also purchase a priority boarding package offered by most cruise lines. Aside from the separate express boarding line, this package often includes an exclusive welcome lunch, priority delivery of checked luggage, and early carry-on luggage drop-off in your cabin.

17. Get Travel Insurance

While it's great to be optimistic about your upcoming cruise, it's important to remember that unforeseen events can happen—whether it's a missed flight, lost luggage, or a medical emergency. Travel insurance is essential for a worry-free cruise, providing peace of mind and protection against unexpected events. - Not all insurance policies are created equal.
- When traveling internationally, verify your insurance includes overseas medical coverage.

- Insurance costs can vary significantly, though most cruisers pay roughly 10% of their base cruise fare.

If delays occur, the cruise line typically assists with rebooking your travel arrangements and getting you to the ship or next port, often at no extra cost. Bundled air-and-cruise packages may also include transfers to the ship and other perks, making the process more seamless. While cruise line airfare can sometimes be competitively priced, the main advantage is the added protection and convenience. If you book flights independently, aim to secure them 3–6 months in advance to get the best fares—especially during peak travel times such as spring break, summer, or Christmas. Whether booking through the cruise line or independently, confirm your

reservation with the airline at least 24 hours before departure to avoid surprises.

26. First-Time Cruisers

A short 3 to 5-day cruise is ideal for first-time cruisers as it's more affordable, offers a variety of activities and a few stops, and provides a taste of cruising without a long commitment. Also, if you've never cruised before, avoid itineraries with more sea days as they increase the chances of seasickness.

27. Take Advantage of Loyalty Programs and Return Passenger Discounts

If you've sailed with a cruise line before, check if they offer loyalty programs or discounts for return passengers. Most cruise lines reward past guests with perks such as cabin upgrades, discounted fares, onboard credits, early boarding, lounge access, complimentary drinks, Wi-Fi, and laundry services.

28. Look for Group Discounts

If you're traveling with friends or family, look into group discounts. Cruise lines usually offer discounted rates when booking 8+ cabins, offering 5–15% savings. Group bookings can also provide added perks, like onboard credits, private events, or even a free cabin for the group organizer.

29. Cruising with Mobility Challenges

If you experience mild movement difficulties, it's best to book a cabin situated mid-ship and near elevators, as these locations reduce walking distances. Wheelchair or scooter users can reserve an accessible cabin, which includes features like wider doorways, wheelchair-friendly showers, grab bars, and lowered furniture. Cruise ships offer a small number of these rooms, so booking early, ideally 6 to 12 months in advance, is highly recommended.

All major cruise lines permit personal wheelchairs and scooters onboard and provide complimentary wheelchairs for boarding and disembarking. However, scooters available for rent require additional payment.

When making your reservation, you will typically need to provide medical documentation or complete a special needs form. At that time, be sure to request any additional support you might need, such as priority boarding, wheelchair assistance, a shower stool, or accessible theater seating.

Important considerations:

- Notify the cruise line about your mobility requirements when booking.
- Verify tender port accessibility; some require navigating stairs or physical transfers.
- Consider bringing a collapsible wheelchair for tight spaces.
- Always confirm excursion accessibility in advance, as some tours may not accommodate mobility devices.

30. Cruising with Vision Loss

With proper planning, cruising with vision problems can still be a relaxing and enjoyable experience, especially since many cruise lines offer accessibility features such as large-print materials, audio announcements, and staff assistance. Bringing essentials such as magnifiers, extra glasses, or screen readers can further enhance comfort and independence throughout the trip.

31. Cruising with Kids

1. Booking a cabin for a family involves a few important considerations to ensure a comfortable, convenient, and safe stay:

- **Location:** A mid-ship and lower-decks cabin helps prevent seasickness and keeps you near elevators and stairs.

- **Cabin Size & Layout:** Look for family cabins, interconnecting rooms, or suites with extra space. Bunk beds, pull-out sofas, or separate sleeping areas help keep everyone comfortable.
- **Safety:** If booking a balcony cabin, ensure it has childproof locks or high railings. Interior or oceanview cabins may be safer for younger kids.
- **Amenities & Convenience:** Being near restrooms, dining venues, the pool area, and the kids' club saves time and hassle.

2. When cruising with a kid who has a different surname, you will usually need to bring:

- The kid's passport or birth certificate.
- A notarized consent letter from the non-traveling parent.
- Proof of relationship (such as birth or adoption papers).

Note that some cruise lines may require additional documentation, so it's advisable to review their policies in advance.

3. Cruising with a baby or toddler

While many cruise ships offer amenities like kids' menus, cribs, high chairs, and kids' clubs, it's important to keep a few things in mind:

- Choose shorter itineraries and family-oriented ships to ensure a comfortable and enjoyable trip for everyone.
- Some cruise lines allow only kids aged 3–17 in their kids' clubs, and others offer programs, often with parental supervision, for children under 3. Additionally, many ships provide babysitting services, enabling parents to enjoy some time to themselves.
- Pack essentials like baby food, regular and pool diapers, water bottles, and medicines, as these may not be available onboard.
- Bringing a stroller on a cruise is a must for families with young children, but choose a compact, lightweight, and foldable model to easily navigate narrow ship corridors and crowded ports. You can also bring a portable fan that attaches to the stroller to help

keep your child calm during warm days on deck or while exploring ports.

- If your child is used to bathing in one, consider bringing a small inflatable bathtub for use inside the cabin and during beach visits ashore.
- A white noise machine is helpful when cruising with a baby or toddler, as it masks unfamiliar noises and creates a calming sleep environment in the cabin.

32. Cruising Solo

Some cruise ships offer solo cabins for independent travelers, helping them avoid the high cost of additional single fees. Whether you're seeking quiet time or new connections, solo cruising offers the best of both worlds—you can relax and enjoy the cruise on your terms or join social gatherings, meetups, and group activities organized by the cruise ship. The number of these cabins is limited, so it's best to book early to secure your spot.

33. Avoid Relying on Old Reviews

The cruise industry is highly competitive, with new ships launching yearly and services constantly improving. If you've found an itinerary or deal that seems perfect for you, don't let outdated reviews from years ago make you second-guess your decision.

34. Same Price, Double Value

If you're cruising with family, check the price of booking two cabins instead of one. Sometimes, booking two standard cabins costs no more than reserving a single upgraded room, and you'll still enjoy extra space and a second bathroom.

35. Consider Sailing from Nearby Ports

Look for cruises that depart from ports closer to your home. Cruises from smaller or regional ports often have lower fees and related

expenses than cruises departing from major hubs. Choosing a nearby embarkation port can also save on flights and hotel stays, making your trip even more affordable.

36. Bed Configuration

You typically choose your bed configuration during the cabin selection process when booking your cruise or during the online check-in. Standard options include two twin beds that can be converted into a queen-size bed. King-size beds are rare and usually only found in higher-end suites.

37. Cruise YouTubers are Incredibly Helpful

On YouTube, you can find detailed ship tours (even tours of your specific cabin if you're lucky), reviews, tips and tricks, comparisons of cruise lines, and previews of the ports you'll visit.

38. Book a Future Cruise While Onboard

Booking future cruise while onboard offers perks like discounted rates, onboard credit, and flexible payment options. Even better, most cruise lines let you transfer onboard bookings to your travel agent and usually permit at least one penalty-free modification (e.g., ship or sail date). To secure these benefits, visit the future cruise sales desk and plan your next adventure while enjoying your current one.

• Ways to Get a Cabin Upgrade

Scoring a cabin upgrade on a cruise can feel like winning the lottery. Still, with the right strategies, you can increase your chances of enjoying a more luxurious stateroom without paying extra. Here's how to potentially get an upgrade.

- **Book Early or Last-Minute:** Booking early secures your preferred cabin and often unlocks upgrade opportunities before higher categories sell out. Last-minute deals may also include free upgrades as cruise lines try to fill remaining cabins close to departure.
- **Be Loyal to a Cruise Line:** Frequent cruisers often receive perks, including cabin upgrades, as a reward for their loyalty.
- **Celebrate a Special Occasion:** When booking, mention birthdays, anniversaries, or honeymoons. Cruise lines sometimes offer upgrades to make celebrations even more special.
- **Ask Nicely at Check-In:** When checking in at the terminal, politely ask about cabin upgrade availability. You might be lucky if there's space.
- **Be Flexible with Your Cabin Assignment:** Booking a 'guarantee' cabin can get you a free upgrade if higher-category cabins are available. However, booking a 'guarantee' cabin doesn't ensure an upgrade and may result in being assigned a noisy room or a room with an obstructed view.
- **Travel During Off-Peak Seasons:** Cruises are less crowded during off-peak times, which increases the probability of unsold cabins and potential upgrades.
- **Build a Relationship with a Travel Agent:** A good travel agent may have insider connections or be notified of upgrade opportunities before they're widely available.
- **If Offered, Bid for an Upgrade:** Many cruise lines allow passengers to bid for cabin upgrades, usually via email invitation. While not free, you might secure a better cabin at a fraction of the regular cost. Note that when you bid for an upgrade, you typically do not know the exact cabin you'll receive in advance, which could mean ending up in a noisy area or far from key amenities. If your bid is accepted, it's

usually nonrefundable and cannot be changed, so only bid if you're flexible with the outcome.

While there's no promise of a free upgrade, these tips can increase your chances. Even if you don't get one, remember that the real joy of cruising comes from the overall journey, not just the cabin.

◦ **Packing for a Cruise**

● **Essentials to Bring**

Packing for a cruise requires careful planning to ensure you have everything you need for a smooth and enjoyable vacation. Here's a list of essentials to bring along.

1. Travel Documents

- **Passport or ID:** Most cruises require a passport for international travel, and for closed-loop cruises that begin and end at the same port, some cruise lines allow you to sail with only a government-issued ID and an official birth certificate. However, keeping your passport with you while on a cruise is highly recommended. Cruise lines typically handle most travel documentation, but having your passport on hand ensures you're prepared for any unexpected situations, such as needing to disembark at a port in another country or in case of an emergency. Note that cruises in the European Union and Schengen countries require passports issued within the last 10 years at the time of entry, so always check the issue date to avoid denied boarding! Also, remember to check the expiration date of your passport. Many countries require passports to be

valid for at least six months beyond your travel dates, so ensure your passport meets these requirements well in advance.

To smoother immigration checks, most cruise lines temporarily collect passports for multi-country itineraries. On closed-loop sailings (like most Caribbean cruises), you'll typically keep your passport unless specified.

- **Cruise Documents:** Print your e-ticket, boarding passes, luggage tags, health forms, and excursion confirmations, which the cruise line will email to you in electronic formats. If you have a cabin assignment, you can print your luggage tags and some other relevant documents soon after booking. If you have booked a 'guarantee' cabin, print your luggage tags once the cruise line assigns your cabin number, typically a few days before sailing. While checked luggage must have tags to be delivered to your cabin, it's a good idea to print an extra tag for your carry-on so you'll have your cabin number handy once onboard.
- **Insurance Documents:** If you've purchased travel insurance, carry copies of your policy details, including coverage limits and emergency contacts from your provider.
- **Hotel Reservations and Flight Tickets:** Technical issues are always possible, so bring printed and digital copies of all hotel confirmations. For flights, carry your ticket or boarding pass and ensure the name on it matches the one on your passport to avoid check-in problems.
- **Prescription Documents and Blood Type:** If you take any prescription medications, bring the original, labeled bottles and a doctor's note explaining your medical condition and the need for those medications. If you don't already know it, identify your blood type as well.
- **Visa:** If your ship stops in a country that requires a visa, bring it with you.

- **List of Important Contacts and Passwords:** During the cruise, your phone can get stolen, dropped, or lost. Have a printed list of passwords, important contacts, and email addresses, including your cruise lines.
- **Backup Your Travel Documents:** Before traveling, email PDF copies of your documents to yourself and also make physical photocopies. This dual backup could be a lifesaver if originals are lost or stolen. When packing, store the original documents in your carry-on and place the photocopies in your checked luggage.

2. Clothing

- **Casual Clothes:** Light, breathable clothing for daytime activities and shore excursions (e.g., t-shirts, shorts).

However, you'll likely be turned away and asked to change if you arrive at the main dining room for dinner wearing shorts.
- **Themed Night Attire:** Many cruises feature themed nights, like White Night, 70s Disco, or Tropical Night, where guests are encouraged to dress to match the theme. Packing a few flexible pieces (e.g., a white outfit, floral shirt, or retro accessories) can make the experience more enjoyable and help you get into the spirit.
- **Light Jacket or Sweater:** Cruise ships maintain cooler indoor temperatures for comfort, humidity control, and hygiene. Bringing a light jacket or sweater is a must, even on tropical cruises.

- **Active Wear:** If you plan to be active, bring sports gear suitable for your activities (e.g., workout clothes, running shoes, fitness tracker).
- **Swimwear:** Don't forget multiple swimsuits for poolside fun, beach days, and spa visits.
- **Shoes:** Pack a pair of comfortable shoes for excursions and walking around the ship, dress shoes if needed for formal nights, flip-flops which are ideal for poolside relaxation, spa visits, cabin wear, and casual walks on deck, and water shoes to protect your feet from sharp rocks, hot sand, and slippery surfaces. Consider packing your shoes in shoe bags or plastic shower caps to keep your luggage clean and organized.

3. Toiletries and Personal Care

- **Sunscreen:** Protect yourself from the sun, especially on deck and during beach days. Using reef-friendly sunscreen is highly recommended because it protects marine life by avoiding harmful chemicals that damage coral reefs and ocean ecosystems.
- **Shampoo, Soap, and Other Basics:** Most cruise lines provide basic toiletries, but you may want to bring your preferred items.
- **Lip Balm:** Bringing lip balm on a cruise is essential to protect your lips from sun, wind, and saltwater exposure.
- **Hair Dryer:** Most cruise ships provide hair dryers in every cabin, either mounted on the wall or stored in a drawer. While they're usually good for basic use, they may not be as powerful as yours at home. If you prefer a specific model or need more heat, you can bring your own — just ensure it meets the ship's safety requirements. Always check your cruise line's policy before packing one.
- **Toilet Paper:** Consider packing a small amount of toilet paper if you prefer a specific brand or have a medical condition that

requires a particular type. However, it should be 1-ply or quick-dissolving to avoid clogging the ship's sensitive waste system.

- **Room Spray:** Bringing a small air freshener helps neutralize cabin odors from wet swimwear, towels, shoes, or food smells. Compact sprays or gel fresheners are ideal, but avoid open flames or strong scents that might bother others.
- **Poo-Pourri:** Bringing Poo-Pourri (or other fragrant toilet spray) on a cruise ship is important because it helps neutralize odors in small bathrooms. It's a discreet and effective way to keep the cabin fresh and comfortable for everyone.
- **Laundry Detergent:** Bringing travel-size laundry detergent on a cruise can be a good idea, especially for longer sailings or when packing light. It allows you to wash small items in your cabin sink, saving you money on laundry services. This is especially handy for personal towels or re-wearing essentials, such as swimwear, socks, or workout clothes.

4. Technology and Accessories

- **Phone and Charger:** Bring your phone, charger, and any necessary adapters.
- **Travel Router:** Before going on a cruise, check the cruise line's policy on routers. If allowed, consider bringing a travel router and sharing a single internet package with your entire family. Simply connect the router to the ship's Wi-Fi, and then link all your devices to the router.
- **Step Counter:** Wearing a smartwatch with a step counter on a cruise allows you to track your activity levels, especially when walking around the ship and during shore visits. While there are phone apps with the same function, a smartwatch does a better job of keeping you motivated to reach your daily fitness goals.
- **Old-Fashioned Wristwatch:** Bring a simple wristwatch to stay on ship time, as phones and smartwatches may automatically adjust time during shore visits or time zone shifts.

- **Power Strip:** Cruise cabins typically include North American (120 Volts) outlets and European (220 Volts) sockets, along with USB ports—although these are often very limited in number, making it challenging to charge multiple devices at the same time. Bringing your own cruise-approved, non-surge-protected power strip ensures you can power phones, tablets, cameras, and other gadgets simultaneously, keeping you connected and ready for every adventure.
- **Camera:** To capture those special moments, a camera or smartphone with extra storage can help preserve memories.
- **White Noise Machine:** Bringing a white noise machine on a cruise helps create a calming sleep environment by masking unfamiliar sounds. Noise-canceling headphones or earplugs can be an alternative if you prefer not to use this kind of device.
- **Portable Power Bank:** A portable power bank ensures your devices stay charged throughout long days exploring ports or the ship.
- **Waterproof Phone Case:** A waterproof phone case can protect your phone at the ship's pool or during beach visits.
- **Binoculars:** Binoculars are a must-have for spotting distant wildlife, scenic coastal views, and other ships on the horizon.
- **Travel Fan:** While you can control the temperature in your cabin and likely won't need it indoors, a battery-powered fan can be a lifesaver on hot, sunny days by the pool or during shore visits.
- **Drone:** A small drone lets you capture stunning aerial photos and videos of scenic ports, coastlines, and the ship itself. However, always check the cruise line's drone policy and local regulations, as they're often restricted onboard and in certain destinations.

5. Money and Cards

- **Credit and Debit Cards:** Most cruise lines operate on a cashless system, so be sure to bring a credit or debit card for onboard purchases and shore visits. Also, get a spare card as a backup in case your primary one has issues.
- **Cash:** It's helpful to bring a small amount of cash for tips and spending at ports. Most ships have ATMs onboard, but using an ATM on a cruise ship can come with higher fees than on land. If popular currencies like the U.S. dollar or euro aren't accepted in your ports of call, obtain local currency before sailing and get more in ports if needed.
- **Travel Wallet:** Keep your cards, cash, and ID organized with a travel wallet.

6. Health and Safety Items

- **Medications:** Don't forget any prescription medications you may take, as well as any over-the-counter items, such as pain relievers, seasickness remedies, laxatives, allergy medications, or dental repair kits. With all the food options onboard, bringing probiotics is also important. They help digestion while adjusting to rich meals, buffet foods, or potentially upset stomachs. To avoid inconveniences when flying to your embarkation port, keep your prescription medications in their original packaging with the original label, and if you want, transfer them to a pill organizer once onboard. Also, ensure the name on the prescription matches the name on your passport, and avoid mixing different pills in the same container.

Another important thing is to pack your medications in your carry-on bag, as checked luggage can be delayed or lost. If you're traveling by car, using a pill organizer only is fine.

Remember that bringing extra medications is very important, as delays on your cruise or flights can happen (e.g., during

hurricane season in the Caribbean, cruise lines may extend ship itineraries to ensure a safe return to the home port).

- **Prescription Glasses and Lens Cleaning Solution:** If you wear prescription glasses, make sure to bring them. While you can easily buy sunscreen on board, corrective glasses may not be as readily available. If you forget them, you'll have to wait until the first port of call to buy a pair, which could mean missing out on a full day of your trip. If you have a spare pair of glasses, bring them as well.
- **First-Aid Kit:** A basic kit with bandages, antiseptics, blister plasters, insect repellent for tropical destinations, and other essentials is helpful for treating small wounds, irritations, or discomforts.
- **Hand Sanitizer:** Ships provide sanitizer stations, but bringing your hand sanitizer is always a good idea, especially for shore visits.
- **Disinfecting Wipes:** Embarkation day is the busiest day for cabin attendants, and they often don't have time to thoroughly sanitize your room. Always bring disinfecting wipes to clean high-touch surfaces yourself. Like hand sanitizer, wipes can also be very handy during shore visits.
- **Water Bottle:** Staying hydrated is essential, so consider bringing a reusable water bottle. Most ships have water stations located in the buffet, gym, and pool areas, where you can refill it. You can also refill your bottle in your cabin using tap water, which is typically safe to drink. For extra peace of mind, bring a reusable bottle with a built-in filter. If you're traveling with family, bring bottles in different colors.
- **Plug-In Night Light:** Bringing a plug-in nightlight on a cruise can be practical, as it provides soft light for nighttime navigation without disturbing sleep. Another option is a motion sensor nightlight.

7. Cruise-Specific Items

- **Patience:** This is one of the most valuable things to bring on a cruise, as you can expect some waiting during boarding, shore excursions, and main dining room seatings. Crowded elevators, slow internet, or bad weather can also spoil your mood if you let them. A calm attitude and a smile will go a long way in overcoming these inconveniences.
- **Lanyards, Neck Straps, and Wristbands:** Many passengers use these accessories to carry their cruise cards or chips. They can be bought from online retailers, preordered through some cruise lines, or purchased onboard.
- **Luggage Tag Holders:** These holders will protect your paper cruise tags from tearing or getting wet, ensuring your luggage is easily identifiable and reaches your cabin without issues. They come in all sizes and styles, so you'll easily find one that fits your specific tags.
- **Day Bag or Backpack:** A small day bag for excursions or trips to the pool is always handy.
- **Magnets:** Cruise ships' walls are typically made of metal, making magnets a helpful item to bring on board. You can use them to hang and organize daily schedules, excursion tickets, or lightweight bags, freeing up counter space and keeping your cabin tidy.
- **Door Magnet:** A decorative or personalized magnet makes it easier to identify your room among a sea of identical doors. It's a simple yet effective way to avoid confusion while adding a fun touch to your cabin entrance. Just be cautious with magnets in the form of pineapples, which are often associated with partner swapping. Also, keep in mind that using stickers or other adhesives to decorate your cabin door is typically prohibited.
- **Magnetic Hooks:** Bringing magnetic hooks on a cruise ship is a practical way to maximize storage space. Magnetic hooks can be easily attached to metal surfaces, such as walls, ceilings, or

doors, providing a convenient place to hang items like lanyards, hats, towels, or jackets. Bring heavy-duty magnetic hooks to hang bags or other heavier items.

- **Towels:** Most cruise lines provide beach towels for use on private islands or other ports where beaches are the main attraction, as well as regular towels for use at the ship's pool. But picture stepping out of the water and seeing rows of chairs with identical towels. Having your own unique towel makes it easy to spot your spot and avoid confusion. Consider bringing a microfiber towel, which is lightweight and dries quickly.
- **Beach Towel Clips:** Beach towel clips are highly recommended, as they securely fasten your towel to your chair, preventing it from slipping or blowing away in the wind. They are especially useful on breezy pool decks, during sea days, and for balcony chairs. Additionally, towel clips help mark your spot and keep your towel clean. If you're not a fan of towel clips or you are trying to pack light, towel bands are a great alternative.
- **Travel Shoe Organizer:** Bringing a shoe organizer on a cruise is a great way to maximize limited cabin space and stay organized. You can use it to store not only shoes but also small items like toiletries, accessories, or electronics, keeping everything easily accessible. Note that using over-the-door organizers is prohibited on most cruise lines. This is primarily for safety reasons, as they can block emergency exits and interfere with safety equipment, such as emergency maps. A good idea might be to hang your over-the-door shoe organizer on a hanger and place it in the closet, or bring a magnetic organizer that you will attach to a suitable place.
- **Magnetic Dry Erase Board or Sticky Notes:** These help you stay organized by leaving reminders, schedules, or messages for your travel companions or cabin attendant.

- **Walkie-Talkies:** Bringing walkie-talkies on a cruise is advised when traveling with family, as ships are massive and using the internet for communication can be costly. Walkie-talkies help you stay connected, especially during shore visits or exploring the ship. Choose walkie-talkies that cover the entire ship and feature digital encryption to keep conversations private and secure. Also, some cruise lines offer discounted messaging packages on their apps, making this another convenient way to stay in touch with family and friends onboard.
- **Duffle or Tote Bag:** Bringing an extra lightweight duffle or tote bag on a cruise is a practical move for carrying essentials like towels, sunscreen, books, and snacks during shore excursions. It's also ideal for bringing back souvenirs or any extra items you pick up during your cruise.
- **Luggage Scale:** If you're traveling by plane, wearing a small luggage scale will help you avoid overweight baggage fees. Airlines have strict weight limits, and a portable scale can save you time, money, and stress during your travels.
- **Travel Mug:** This item is especially useful for coffee lovers without a drink package, as coffee can be costly per cup. You can refill it at the buffet and enjoy your drink by the pool or on your balcony.
- **Coffee Creamers:** Cruise ship basic coffee may not always match your taste, and creamer options can be limited. Bringing your favorite coffee creamers ensures you enjoy your morning brew the way you like it. It's a small touch that can make your cruise mornings feel like home.
- **Consider Bringing Your Straws:** Cruise lines often follow strict environmental policies, so you may be given paper straws with your drinks. Having eco-friendly straws made of silicone, metal, or bamboo ensures a more enjoyable drinking experience without the hassle of flimsy paper straws.

- **Snacks and Beverages:** If you have dietary preferences or simply enjoy light bites between meals, consider packing some sealed snacks, such as granola bars, trail mix, or chips. Additionally, on most cruise lines, you can bring 12 cans of soda or sparkling water on embarkation day and one 750-ml bottle of wine or champagne per adult. Some cruise lines also allow a limited amount of bottled water. Note that the minimum age for bringing wine or champagne onboard is 21 on U.S.-based cruises and 18 on some European or Australian sailings, following local drinking laws. Also, it's important to know that beverages must be in your carry-on luggage or hand-carried when boarding. Packing them in the checked luggage risks confiscation. When flying to your embarkation port, protect your wine or champagne in bubble wrap and pack it in your checked luggage, then transfer it to your carry-on at the cruise terminal.

If you're on a longer cruise and your ship doesn't have a self-service laundry facility, avoid these extra costs by bringing enough clothes to last the entire voyage. To minimize unpleasant odors, pack a few fabric softener sheets to place between your worn laundry. If you prefer not to bring soiled clothes home, take advantage of the discounted laundry rates most cruise ships offer toward the end of the voyage. And if packing light is important to you, pack clothes that mix and match and limit shoes to 2-3 versatile pairs.
- **Plan Your Outfits:** Ask your travel agent or contact the cruise line to determine the number of formal nights and the types of

themed nights scheduled during your cruise so you know exactly what to pack.

- **Think Before Packing Clothes with Upside-Down**

Pineapples: Wearing clothes with upside-down pineapples on them on a cruise might send an unintended message, as they are often associated with the swinging lifestyle. If you're not into partner swapping, it's best to avoid pineapple-themed attire to prevent awkward misunderstandings.

- **Pack Carefully to Prevent Wrinkled Clothes:** Bringing steam irons on board is usually prohibited, and most cruise ships do not have self-service laundry facilities. At the same time, they charge hefty fees to iron your clothes, so pack carefully to avoid wrinkles. Rolling the clothes instead of folding them is one way. Additionally, bring wrinkle-release spray as a convenient and budget-friendly solution to keep your clothes looking sharp. And if you forgot wrinkle spray, hang your clothes in the bathroom while taking a shower to smooth out wrinkles.

- **Pack a Change of Clothes in Your Carry-On Bag:** After boarding the ship, it can take several hours for your luggage to be delivered to your cabin. Having a breathable change of clothes and even a dinner outfit on hand ensures you stay comfortable while you wait. Don't forget to include your bathing suit and flip-flops—this way, you can head straight to the pool or hot tub and start enjoying your cruise without delay!

- **Check the Cruise Line Banned Items List:** Be aware that certain items are prohibited on cruise ships, such as large electrical appliances, open-flame candles, marijuana (including CBD products), weapons (even toy ones), handcuffs, and hard alcohol. Different cruise lines have varying rules about what's allowed, so it's important to contact your travel agent or check the list of prohibited items on the cruise line's website before you pack. This way, you will avoid any issues or uncomfortable situations on the first day of your cruise.

● **Check-in Process**

The check-in process is an essential part of your cruise experience, ensuring you're properly registered and ready to board the ship. Here's some before-the-trip advice and an overview of what you can expect during the check-in process.

1. Pre-Cruise Online Check-In

Most cruise lines offer an online check-in process, which is highly recommended to complete as soon as possible. To do that, you must create an account on the cruise line's website and enter your booking details, personal information, and travel documents. Online check-in typically opens 14 to 90 days before your sailing date and closes 24 to 72 hours before departure, depending on the cruise line. It's best to do it as early as possible to secure the preferred boarding times. Completing online check-in also helps save time at the port, making boarding easier. When selecting your embarkation time, choose either early or late times, avoiding the middle ground. Peak hours draw the most passengers, resulting in longer lines and wait times. Note that online check-in usually becomes available only after full payment is made.

2. Arriving at the Embarkation Port City

Arriving a day or two before your ship sets sail offers several benefits that can help secure a smooth and stress-free start to your vacation. First, it allows you to avoid any travel disruptions that might occur, such as flight delays or traffic jams, ensuring that you won't miss the ship's departure. Additionally, you can explore the port city, enjoy local attractions, or get some rest. Arriving ahead of time also gives you the flexibility to navigate transportation to the cruise terminal

without feeling rushed. Overall, arriving early ensures peace of mind and a hassle-free embarkation experience.

3. Arriving at the Cruise Terminal

Arriving at the terminal half an hour early on the day of departure ensures a smooth check-in process and allows time to handle any potential delays. Note that you will likely not be allowed to embark before your scheduled time, so arriving 30 minutes early is sufficient. If you're flying to your cruise departure city, arrange your transportation from the hotel to the terminal in advance. The most reliable options are booking a rideshare or taxi, using the cruise line's transfer service, or checking if your hotel offers a shuttle. When taking a taxi, always agree on the fare before entering. Also, research local rates in advance and carry small bills to avoid overpaying. For the smoothest experience, check if your cruise line offers bundled air and transfer packages that can simplify your planning.

If you're on a closed-loop cruise that starts and ends at the same port and you're driving to the embarkation port city, find a convenient parking spot and take a taxi or rideshare to reach the terminal. If you choose to park at the terminal, which often comes with a significantly higher price tag, take a photo of your parking spot. These facilities are usually enormous, and you'll want to avoid forgetting your car's location after your cruise.

Note that the latest embarkation time is typically 90 minutes to 2 hours before the ship's scheduled departure. If you arrive late, you may be denied boarding without a refund, as the final passenger manifest must be submitted to local authorities promptly after the all-aboard time.

4. Luggage Drop-Off

Upon arrival at the port, you'll drop off your luggage at the cruise terminal, from where it will be sent directly to your cabin. This step

helps streamline the boarding process and ensures that everything arrives safely at your cabin.

5. Security Screening

Much like at an airport, you'll go through a security screening process, where your carry-on bags will be scanned. To avoid inconveniences, follow the cruise line's guidelines regarding prohibited items.

6. Check-In Desk

After security, you'll proceed to the check-in desk, where the staff will verify your documents, explain any important information, and provide you with your cruise card or chip that serves as your cabin key, onboard payment method, and ID that you'll need to tap on the security scanner each time you leave and return to the ship in ports. Also, if your ship uses a cashless system, they will link your credit or debit card to your cruise card or chip. This allows you to make onboard purchases without needing cash, ensuring a smoother checkout process at the end of your cruise. Note that your account is automatically activated once you board the ship and your cruise card or chip is scanned at embarkation. If you have chosen to pay with cash instead of a credit or debit card, you may need to visit the ship's guest services desk first to activate your onboard account.

7. Photo for Cruise Card

You'll likely have your picture taken at check-in to be associated with your cruise card or chip. This ensures a safe and personalized experience, as your cruise card or chip will also serve as your ID and onboard payment method.

8. Boarding the Ship

Once check-in is complete, you'll head to the boarding area to wait for your designated time. When it's your turn, you'll enter the ship via

a gangway or bridge. Note that, after boarding, you won't be able to access your cabin until an announcement is made over the public address system, typically around 1-2 PM, signaling that all the cabins on your deck are ready. This doesn't apply to passengers staying in suites, who board first at around 10:30-11 AM and can access their accommodations earlier.

It's important to know that cruise ships can deny boarding in several cases, including:

- Bringing prohibited items (e.g., weapons, CBD products).
- Being visibly intoxicated.
- Being rude.
- Pregnancy beyond 24 weeks, which is most cruise lines' limit.
- Missing hard copies of the required travel documents.
- Damaged passport.
- Lacking mandatory insurance for high-risk destinations, long voyages, or pre-existing medical conditions.

9. Welcome Onboard Photos

The ship's photographers capture these professional photos (usually with the ship as a background) as you board. They make perfect souvenirs and are typically available for purchase at the end of the cruise. Note that posing is optional—you can simply walk by if you prefer.

10. Enjoy Your Cruise

After completing all check-in procedures, you're free to enjoy a welcome meal, explore the ship, and begin your vacation.

● **Tips for the First Day of Your Cruise**

The first day of the cruise is always exciting, but it can also be a little overwhelming as you get settled into your new environment. Here are some tips to help you make the most of your first day on board.

1. Don't Forget Your Cabin Number

Take a moment to memorize or note your cabin number—it'll save you time and confusion as you settle in and start exploring the ship. It's also essential when trying to access ship services, seek assistance from crew members, or during emergencies.

2. Switch Your Phone to Airplane Mode

Soon after the ship sets sail, your phone will lose signal and might automatically connect to the ship's satellite network. To avoid costly roaming charges, you should switch your phone to airplane mode as soon as you board the ship. Even better, go to your phone settings before boarding and choose the option to select a network manually. This prevents automatic connection to the ship's network and is highly recommended if you think you might forget to enable airplane mode.

Also, it's important to mention that a standard international phone plan or an eSIM works on land in most foreign ports but not at sea. For calls, texts, and data while at sea, activate a cruise phone plan offered by some providers or buy the ship's Wi-Fi package for data.

3. Skip the Crowded Buffet

In the first hours of the cruise, the buffet can become packed as it's the first choice for lunch for most passengers. Skipping the buffet allows you to avoid the long lines and the struggle to find a seat. Instead, consider one of the ship's less crowded sit-down restaurants. The main dining room is typically open for lunch, offering a relaxed

meal while you wait for your cabin to be ready. Additionally, casual options like the poolside grill and cafes are usually open, providing a variety of choices.

4. Book Specialty Restaurants, Spa Treatments

If these are part of your plans but you haven't booked them in advance, prioritize making specialty dining reservations and spa appointments as soon as you board. They are often discounted on embarkation day and fill up quickly. Also, purchase drink and internet packages if needed. To avoid waiting in line, use the cruise line's app, which typically doesn't require paid internet.

5. Cruising with Kids

If you're traveling with kids, make visiting the kids' club one of the priorities after boarding. Even if you've registered online, stop by during the club's opening hours on embarkation day to confirm details and meet the staff. The open house allows your kids to explore the space and potentially meet new friends, making them more comfortable joining activities later.

6. Embarkation Day Safety Briefing

After the last passenger boards the ship, you'll have to attend a mandatory Muster Drill where the crew will explain the ship's emergency procedures, including how to use the life jacket and where your muster station is located. Note that, to minimize large gatherings of people post-pandemic, most cruise lines have updated their safety drill procedures by introducing an e-Muster system. Rather than the traditional group drills, passengers can now review safety information on their stateroom TV or smartphone. Afterward, guided by crew members in colored vests, passengers head to their designated muster stations, where another crew member will confirm that all steps have been completed and address any questions. The

assembly station is typically marked on the life jacket, cabin door, and cruise card.

In most cases, wearing a life jacket during safety drills is no longer required, though a few cruise lines still enforce this rule. You can usually find that information in the daily schedule. If your ship uses an e-Muster system, it's best to complete it shortly after boarding so you can focus on enjoying your cruise.

7. Visit the Pool

To make the most of your first day by the pool, arrive early to enjoy peaceful decks and premium lounge chairs while others are still exploring. For ultimate relaxation, head to adults-only zones, and don't miss the opening-day drink specials at the pool bar.

8. Explore the Ship

Knowing where everything is located helps you avoid getting lost later in the cruise and makes navigating to dining, activities, and shows easier. Start from the top deck and work your way down, familiarizing yourself with key areas like dining venues, bars, elevators, pools, the spa, and entertainment spaces.

9. Settle into Your Stateroom

Once they make a public announcement that it's ready, you can head to your stateroom, and, if that's your plan, take pictures of your cabin or suite as soon as you enter for the first time, as it will never look the same again throughout your trip. Then, unpack and place the empty suitcase under the bed or in the closet so it doesn't take up floor space. After unpacking, familiarize yourself with your cabin's amenities, like the safe, power outlets, USB charging ports, shower, TV, and lighting controls. Be sure to also check for hidden storage spaces. You might find small compartments behind decorative panels, extra storage around mirrors, pull-out drawers beneath the sofa, a hollow compartment inside the ottoman, and shelves below

the sink. When it comes to power outlets and USB ports, they're often very limited, especially on older ships. For additional outlets, check behind beds, nightstands, and desks. Some ships also feature USB ports in lamps, alarm clocks, near dressing tables, or at the back of your TV. Also, check if your cabin's sofa converts into an additional bed, as many cruise lines offer this space-saving feature.

Though doing laundry in your cabin sink might be the last thing on your mind, it's good to know that most ships feature retractable bathroom clotheslines. These are perfect for drying swimwear, hand-washed garments, or wet towels. If there isn't a clothesline in your bathroom or you want to dry more items at once, consider using magnetic hooks. If magnets don't stick well in the bathroom, suction hooks are an alternative option. Note that due to strong winds, drying items on the balcony may cause them to blow into the water.

Unpacking early makes you feel organized and comfortable, especially if traveling on a longer cruise. It also helps you relax after a busy boarding process.

Important: If you notice something in your stateroom is broken or not working, report it right away.

10. Check the Daily Schedule

Cruise ships provide a daily schedule of activities, entertainment, and dining options. In recent years, more cruise lines have shifted to listing these schedules on their apps instead of providing paper copies, often due to environmental concerns and efforts to improve efficiency. Use a highlighter (or the app's bookmark feature) to mark must-see events, ensuring you make the most of your time onboard and don't miss out on anything exciting. Paper daily schedules, if available on your ship, are usually delivered to your cabin each evening. You may also collect one at the guest services desk upon boarding on embarkation day.

11. Store Your Valuables

As soon as you arrive in your cruise cabin, store your valuables in the cabin safe to ensure they're secure throughout your trip. This simple step helps protect items like passports, jewelry, and cash, giving you peace of mind while you enjoy your cruise.

12. Disinfect High-Touch Surfaces

Use disinfectant wipes to clean your room's remote control, door handles, and frequently touched areas.

13. Meet Your Cabin Attendant

On the first day of your cruise, your cabin attendant will typically introduce themselves, often before dinner. It's important to keep in mind that they're there to make your stay as comfortable as possible, so don't hesitate to ask for anything you might need—whether it's extra hangers, a mattress topper, additional pillows or towels, help navigating cabin features, information about the ship, or assistance with any special requests. If you've brought your wine, you can ask your cabin attendant for a corkscrew, to refill your ice bucket daily and to keep wine glasses in your room. At this point, try to remember their name. It builds a friendly connection, often leading to better service throughout your cruise.

So, skip the guest relations desk on embarkation day to avoid long lines. Cabin attendants can handle most requests, and they will know who can handle the rest.

14. Empty the Mini-Bar

On the first day of your cruise, ask the cabin attendant to remove any items from the small fridge so you don't end up with accidental charges for items you didn't consume. An empty fridge also allows you to keep your belongings cool (such as cans of soda you brought on the ship, medications, snacks, and even small portions of food from room service or the buffet).

15. Tip Staff Early

Tipping your cabin attendant, waitstaff, and the bartenders you plan to interact with on the first day of your cruise helps establish a positive rapport and often ensures exceptional service throughout your trip. A small gesture early on can make a big difference in your overall cruise experience.

16. Explore Shore Excursions

If you're interested in taking excursions during your cruise, visit the shore excursion desk or browse the options online. Popular excursions can sell out quickly, so booking early ensures you don't miss out on activities like tours, wine tastings, or cultural experiences at the ports.

17. Capture Memories but Stay Present

The first day sets the tone for your cruise, and you'll want to make the most of it. Take photos, but don't spend the entire day behind the camera.

18. Be Mindful of Motion Sickness

If you're prone to motion sickness, consider taking medication beforehand, try natural remedies like green apples and ginger supplements, or wear motion sickness wristbands. The onboard shops sell seasickness medications—although prices are higher, they operate during set hours and close while the ship is in port to comply with local regulations. Also, complimentary options are often provided at the guest services desk, but bringing your own is always a good idea.

19. Don't Miss the Sailaway Party

Usually hosted by the cruise director, this event features a DJ or live band and breathtaking views as the ship departs. For many, the

sailaway party is the perfect way to start the cruise and connect with other travelers.

20. Dining on Your First Cruise Night

On your first night, you'll usually have three dining options. The main dining room typically offers anytime dining, making it ideal for a relaxed meal if you arrive early. The buffet provides quick, casual dining, while specialty restaurants require reservations. For the best experience, consider specialty restaurants, as they often offer discounts on the first night and serve great food in a less crowded setting. Alternatively, skip the buffet for the quieter main dining room. Remember to pack dinner clothes in your carry-on, as luggage may arrive late.

21. Attend the Welcome Show or Event

On the first night, most cruise ships host a welcome show or event to introduce guests to the ship's amenities, staff, and upcoming entertainment. It's a fun way to settle in, gather useful info, and meet other passengers right at the start of your cruise.

If your passport is not kept by the ship but is stored in your cabin safe, an authorized ship officer may retrieve it and leave it with the local authorities. If there is a possibility of catching the ship at the next port of call, you'll need to arrange and pay for transportation and other expenses.

Note: Onboard credit can be refundable or non-refundable and non-transferable. Check your cruise line's policy to maximize its value. Also, review the fine print or ask your travel agent if onboard credits are per person or cabin; some apply individually, while others are shared.

- **Automatic Gratuities:** Most cruise lines add a daily gratuity charge to your onboard account, which is distributed among the service crew.
- **Bar Service Charges:** A service charge (typically 15–20%) is automatically added to each drink or bar bill. When a drink package is purchased, cruise lines usually include the same gratuity percentage in the package cost.
- **Spa Service Charges:** A gratuity (around 18–20%) is usually added to spa treatment bills. When you buy a spa package, the

same percentage is typically included in the price or added at checkout.

- **Additional Tips:** While automatic gratuities cover most services, it's customary to tip extra for exceptional service.
- **Cash Tips:** Some passengers prefer to tip in cash, especially for personalized service or during shore excursions.

2. Understanding Automatic Gratuities

Cruise lines distribute the gratuities (also called service charges) among the service crew members working in the ship's hotel department. Here's how the distribution typically works:

1. Who Receives the Daily Gratuities

- **Housekeeping:** Your cabin attendant who clean and maintain your room.
- **Dining:** Waitstaff who serve your meals.
- **Other Service Crew:** This may include laundry crew, pool attendants, cleaners, and other service personnel.

2. How Is It Distributed

While those working in departments such as engine, deck, and finance receive fixed salaries fully covered by the cruise line, this does not apply to service employees on most mainstream cruise lines. However, these crew members are guaranteed a base salary. For example, cabin attendants might have a guaranteed salary of \$2000 per month. Depending on the type of rooms they clean and maintain, they typically earn 3-\$4 per passenger per day from gratuities. If no passenger removes the gratuities, a cabin attendant could earn around \$3000 per month. On the other hand, if enough passengers remove gratuities and the attendant's earnings drop to, for example, \$1900, the cruise line ensures that the crew member still receives the guaranteed \$2000 salary. As a result of this system, the salary of crew members who serve a small number of passengers, such as cabin attendants or servers, can vary significantly from paycheck to paycheck. On the contrary, crew members, such as pool

attendants and public area cleaners, tend to have much lower but stable earnings due to a pooled system and the volume of passengers contributing to their salaries.

A small portion of the gratuities may also be shared among departments and used to organize crew events, such as housekeeping parties, to boost morale and foster a sense of community.

A pooled system for distributing gratuities is usually used in the bar department and the ship's spa. The service charges added to every bill or package issued by these departments are collected into a pool and then shared among the employees. This ensures a distribution of earnings based on the team's collective effort.

3. How Much Should You Expect to Pay

The daily gratuity rate typically ranges from 15 to \$25 per person per day, depending on the cruise line and accommodation type. It's important to mention that luxury cruise lines usually include gratuities in the cruise fare, which results in a higher upfront cost. Either way, it's the passengers who cover the crew's salaries.

4. Can You Adjust or Remove Automatic Gratuities

- **Adjust:** Most cruise lines allow you to increase or decrease the amount at guest services.
- **Remove:** You can usually remove automatic gratuities, but this is discouraged as it directly impacts the crew's income. Some passengers choose to remove the gratuities and give the money directly to the crew, but this is also not the greatest idea because many behind-the-scenes crew members who work tirelessly to make your cruise unforgettable may be left empty-handed. Instead of removing gratuities when unhappy with the service, consider addressing the issue. Speak with the crew member involved or the manager to explain your concerns. I also recommend that you don't believe rumors claiming cruise

lines steal gratuities from crew and remove them for that reason. A cruise line worth billions of dollars simply cannot afford such behavior — if this information were leaked, it would sink their reputation. They would never take that risk.

5. Why Are Gratuities Important

- For many crew members, gratuities make up a significant portion of their income. By paying automatic gratuities (or prepaying them), you ensure that hardworking employees are fairly compensated and recognized for their efforts.

- **Muster Drill:** All passengers must attend safety training before the ship's departure. This drill covers emergency procedures, life jacket usage, and assembly stations. Note that, to minimize large gatherings of passengers post-pandemic, most cruise lines have revised their safety drill protocols. Rather than the traditional group drills, guests now review safety information on their cabin TV or smartphone. Afterward, they head to their designated assembly station, where a crew member confirms that all steps have been completed and addresses any questions.

Best Tips:

- Pay close attention to instructions.
- Familiarize yourself with the location of your assigned assembly station.
- Practice putting on your life jacket to ensure you know how to use it.

2. Emergency Procedures

- **Alarm Signals:** Learn the ship's emergency alarm signals, such as seven short blasts followed by one long blast, which indicates a general emergency.

Candles and Plug-in Essential Oil Diffusers: These items are typically confiscated during boarding due to fire safety regulations.

Best Tip:

- Pack battery-operated alternatives, such as LED candles or portable aroma diffusers.

• Secret Code Words That Keep Cruise Ships and Passengers Safe

To ensure the safety of everyone on board, cruise ships utilize well-established emergency systems that include both passenger and crew drills, as well as internal communication protocols. While muster drills prepare guests for general emergencies, the crew uses coded public announcements to respond quickly and discreetly. Here are some emergency code words used on cruise ships.

- **Medical Emergencies:** Typically named "Code Alpha" or "Code Blue," followed by location, which signals medical teams to respond.

- **Fire Onboard:** "Code Bravo" followed by location (e.g., "Bravo, Bravo, Bravo, Deck 5 Forward, Starboard") alerts fire teams.
- **Man Overboard:** "Oscar, Oscar, Oscar" (confirmed) or "Code Mike" (suspected) triggers search protocols.
- **Security-Related Emergencies:** "Code Delta," followed by a location (e.g., "Delta, Delta, Delta, Deck 3 Midship"), is used to alert crew to a potential security threat, such as an intruder or suspicious item. This announcement is made over the ship's internal communication system and is not broadcast to passengers to avoid causing panic.
- **Hazardous Spills:** Often named "Code Papa," followed by location, which signals the crew to respond to a chemical or oil spill incident.

Passengers should never attempt to intervene in emergencies, as highly trained crew members are equipped to handle all situations. Remain calm, and always follow crew instructions, whether that means moving to a designated area or simply continuing your activities.

• General Safety Tips

- **Enjoy in Moderation:** Avoid excessive alcohol consumption, especially when participating in activities or exploring ports.
- **Know the Ship's Layout:** Familiarize yourself with the location of key areas like the medical center, guest services desk, assembly stations, and emergency exits.

- **Don't Call It a Boat:** Referring to your cruise ship as a 'boat' is a major faux pas. Experienced cruisers take this distinction

seriously, and they'll quickly set you straight. To stay safe, always refer to it as a 'cruise ship.'

• Leaving the Ship

Disembarkation day marks the end of your cruise, and while it can feel bittersweet, proper preparation ensures a smooth and stress-free process. From packing up to leaving the ship, here's what to expect and some tips to make your final day as seamless as possible.

1. Before Disembarkation

- **Disembarkation Briefing:** On the last sea day of the cruise, your cruise director or guest services team will hold a disembarkation briefing, usually in the main theater. This session covers all key departure details, including luggage procedures, customs requirements, open venues for breakfast, and assigned exit times. If you'd rather skip the live session, you can find the same information on your cabin TV or the daily newsletter. Additionally, about 24 hours before disembarking, you'll receive personalized debarkation instructions delivered to your cabin. These include your assigned luggage tags, departure time, designated meeting points, and customs forms when required.
- **Settle Your Onboard Account:** Check your final bill for accuracy and ensure all charges are settled. This can usually be done via the ship's app, cabin TV, or the guest services desk. Remember that resolving any issues with your cruise account before leaving the vessel is essential. Once you're off the ship, addressing billing errors can be difficult or even impossible. Also, keep a copy of your final statement in case any unexpected charges appear later.

- **Pack Your Luggage:** Pack your belongings, keeping only the essentials in your carry-on. Then, attach the luggage tags to your bags and leave them outside your cabin. The timeframe for placing your bags outside your cabin door varies by cruise line, but it typically falls between 9:00 PM and 11:00 PM. Note that leaving your bags outside is optional; you can carry them off the ship yourself on the final morning, which is known as self-assist disembarkation or express walk-off, and is offered by most cruise lines. Carrying your luggage allows you to disembark earlier and faster than standard procedures. Also, consider using colorful straps or distinctive stickers to make your luggage easily recognizable. This simple step helps you spot your bags quickly at baggage claim and prevents others from accidentally taking them.
- **Prepare Travel Documents:** Have your passport, customs forms if required, and any other necessary documents ready.
- **Buy Cruise Photos Before Disembarking:** Official cruise photos are typically deleted from the ship's system after the cruise is over, making it impossible to purchase them later. Digital copies may be available online for a limited time, but the selections are fewer than on board.
- **Show Your Appreciation for the Crew:** On the last day of your cruise, leaving a thank-you note for the crew members you interacted with is a thoughtful gesture that shows appreciation for their hard work. If you were pleased with the service, an additional tip would always be appreciated and would mean a lot to the crew.
- **Early Wake-Up Call:** Disembarkation typically begins early, so set an alarm to ensure you're ready on time.

2. Disembarkation Morning

- **Final Breakfast:** Enjoy your final meal onboard, whether in the main dining room or the buffet.

- **Check Your Cabin:** Double-check drawers, closets, and the safe to ensure you haven't left anything behind.
- **Wait for Your Group:** Disembarkation is often done in groups, based on luggage tags or deck numbers. Check the schedule provided the day before and listen for announcements.
- **Cabin Exit Deadlines:** On the final morning, most cruise lines require passengers to vacate cabins by 8:00–8:30 AM but let you wait in public areas until your luggage tag number, deck, or color is called for disembarking. However, some lines allow you to stay in your room until your group is announced. Either way, all passengers must typically exit the ship by 9:30–10:00 AM to prepare for the next sailing. Please don't forget to leave your room on time. The cabin attendants need to clean quickly before new passengers arrive, and staying late makes it harder for them.

If I had to choose only one thing that could make a significant difference in your cruise, then this is the one. Working 10-15 hours every single day for 6-9 months while being far from family is a physically and mentally draining experience. Providing excellent service with a broad smile for all that time is not easy, so please be kind to them. They'll make your vacation unforgettable. There are more ways to connect with crew members easily, and here are some:

1. **Learn Their Names:** Remembering the names of the crew members you interact with, like your cabin attendant, servers, and bartenders, shows sincere appreciation for their hard work, strengthens personal connections, and leads to more attentive service throughout your cruise. A simple "Good morning, Maria"

or "Thanks for the recommendation, Nikola" makes all the difference.

- 2. Learn a Few Below-Deck Code Words and Use Them When Talking to Crew Members:** The ship's crew often uses foreign or slang words and phrases when talking to each other, and a passenger would surely make a crew member's day by using some of them. Here are a few:

Paisano (Paisana)

It means a fellow countryman/countrywoman. You can't go wrong using this word when talking with a crew member.

Mamagaio

One of the most famous words in the cruise ship dictionary is mamagaio. We say it for somebody who spends time in the cabin while on duty, but always as a joke.

Lagege

When crew members are very busy, they say, I'm lagege.

3. Don't Put Crew Members in a Difficult Position

Avoid asking crew members for favors that violate common sense or the cruise line's policies, such as accessing crew areas, babysitting your children, requesting complimentary drinks, or having them handle your laundry. Even if they want to help, accommodating such requests could put their jobs at risk.

4. Ask for What You Need

Always remember—"no" is the default answer until you ask. You might be surprised by what you can receive simply by making a polite and reasonable request. For example, if you ask dining staff for a cake, a song, or table decorations for a birthday/anniversary, they may be happy to accommodate. Also, asking a pool attendant about unoccupied sun chairs at 1 PM on a sea day could lead to them bringing out a couple from storage. Saying 'no' to a passenger is

unnatural on cruise ships, but always be respectful and avoid taking advantage.
