Thin Articles

Another common problem is **thin content**.

Thin articles are posts that are simply too short to be helpful.

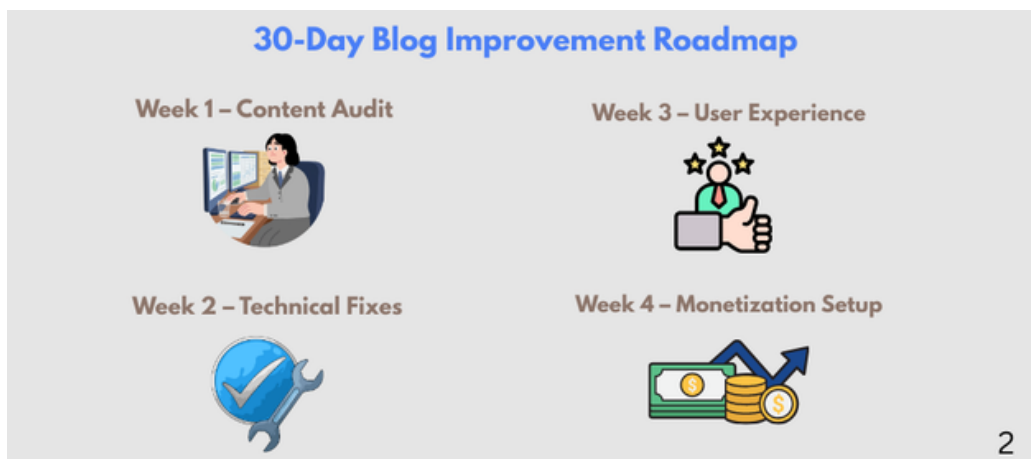

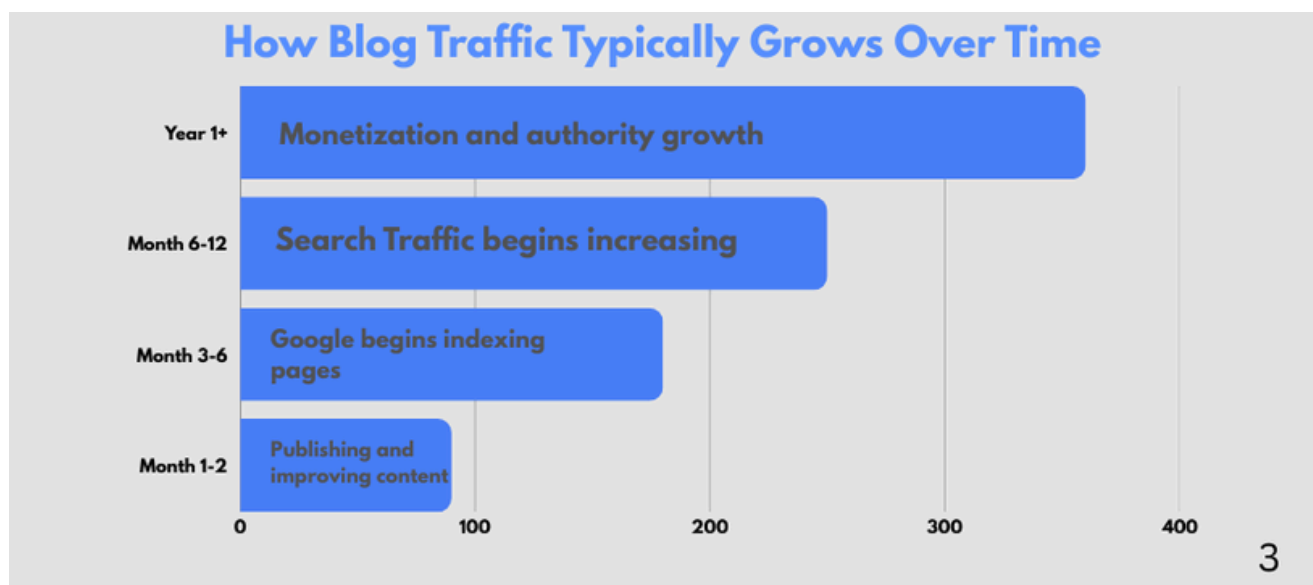

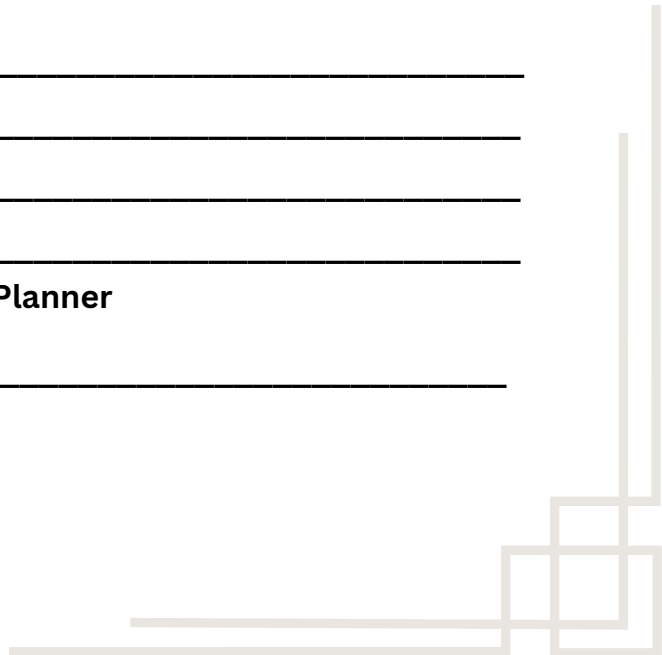
