## My \$30K Story

As an artist balancing creativity with a full-time job, I understand the challenge of finding time and resources to pursue your passion. Within 18 months, I successfully secured over \$30,000 in grants and fellowships while maintaining my day job, funding that transformed my artistic practice and laid the foundation for Artchive.

## The Grant Landscape: Where's the Money?

Artists often miss opportunities simply because they don't know where to look. Here's a breakdown of the primary funding sources available:

### 1. Institutional Grants

- Museums and galleries often offer project funding for emerging artists
- Universities and colleges provide fellowships, even for non-students
- Art centers and collectives frequently run smaller, more accessible grant programs

### 2. Government Funding

- National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) offers various programs
- State arts councils provide region-specific opportunities
- Local arts commissions offer community-based funding with less competition

### 3. Private Foundations

- Family foundations dedicated to arts and culture
- Corporate arts initiatives supporting diverse creative voices
- Donor-advised funds focused on community development through arts

### 4. Identity-Based Opportunities

- BIPOC-focused grants specifically supporting minority artists
- Discipline-specific funds for your particular medium
- Career stage grants targeting emerging artists (there's even some for established artists only!)

## Finding Opportunities: Where to Look

Bookmark these essential resources for regular grant hunting:

1. Artwork Archive – One of the most comprehensive database of grant opportunities
2. CAFE.org – Global network of artist residencies and associated funding
3. New York Foundation for the Arts (NYFA.org) – Extensive listings beyond New York
4. Creative Capital (creative-capital.org) – Both grants and professional development resources
5. Your state arts council website – Often overlooked local opportunities

**PRO TIP:** Set a calendar reminder for the 1st of each month to spend 60 minutes reviewing current opportunities.

Consistency is key!

## Building Relationships: The Hidden Key to Funding

Grants aren't just about paperwork, they're about RELATIONSHIPS. Here's how to build meaningful connections:

- 
- Attend funder information sessions (virtual or in-person)
- Follow program officers on professional social media\*\*
- Volunteer to serve on grant panels when possible
- Thank funders publicly when you receive support
- Submit thorough, timely reports for any funding received

Remember: Today's \$500 grant could lead to next year's \$5,000 fellowship if you nurture the relationship.

## Timeline: Your First Funding Year

### Month 1: Research & Planning

- Identify 10-15 potential opportunities that align with your work
- Create a master calendar of deadlines
- Begin gathering core application materials

### Month 2: Develop Your Core Materials

- Write your artist statement and biography (you can reuse these! I even have about 2-3 different versions that say the same thing but it has a bit of a uniqueness to each one!)
- Update your CV/resume with an emphasis on artistic achievements (focus on high level)
- Organize and document your portfolio professionally (be creative yet concise- provide clarity)

### Month 3: First Application Submission

- Start with a smaller, local opportunity to build confidence
- Allow 2-3 weeks for preparation and refinement
- Have at least one trusted colleague review before submission



## Months 4-6: Build Momentum

- Submit 2-3 carefully selected applications
- Begin networking with funded artists and organizations
- Attend at least one grant information session

## Months 7-12: Refine and Expand

- Incorporate feedback from any rejections
- Target increasingly competitive opportunities
- Begin strategizing multi-year funding plans



## CASE STUDY: How I Secured My First \$10K

My breakthrough came with a \$10,000 project grant from my state arts council. Here's exactly how it happened:

1. Research: I spent hours studying previously funded projects on their website
2. Relationship: I attended a virtual information session and asked thoughtful questions
3. Preparation: I started my application 6 weeks before the deadline, not 6 days
4. Feedback: I had three different perspectives review my application:
  - A fellow artist who had received this grant
  - A non-artist who could assess clarity
  - A professional grant writer who spotted technical issues
5. Follow-through: After receiving funding, I provided regular updates to the program officer where I was able to build a relationship that led to additional opportunities

The result wasn't just \$10,000, it was CREDIBILITY that opened doors to further funding

## BONUS: Quick start: What to Do Today

1. Spend 30 minutes researching your local arts council website
2. Set up a dedicated email folder for funding opportunities
3. Create a simple spreadsheet to track application deadlines
4. Schedule 2 hours this week to update your artist statement
5. Connect with one funded artist in your network to learn from their experience
