Shopping in Mexico

Shopping in Mexico can be a mix of convenience, adventure, and discovery. You'll find everything from large supermarkets and shopping malls to small specialty stores and traditional markets.

1. Grocery Shopping

Mexico has a mix of **supermarkets, local markets, and specialty stores** for groceries.

Popular Supermarkets:

- **Walmart** – Widely available, with familiar products and bulk options.
- **Chedraui** – Mid-range supermarket with imported and local goods.
- **Soriana** – Large chain offering groceries, clothing, and household items.

Local Markets (Mercados)

Home & Furniture Shopping

- **Costco & Sam's Club** – Good for bulk household items, appliances, and imported goods.
 - **IKEA Mexico** – Available in select cities for affordable furniture.
 - **Local Artisan Shops** – Many expats furnish their homes with **handmade furniture** from local workshops, often **customizable** at reasonable prices.

Street Food & Casual Dining

- **Tacos al Pastor** – Marinated pork with pineapple on corn tortillas.

- **Tlacoyos & Gorditas** – Corn-based snacks stuffed with beans, cheese, or meat.
- **Elotes & Esquites** – Corn on the cob or in a cup with mayo, cheese, and chili.

Casual & Mid-Range Restaurants

- **Fondas** – Small, family-run restaurants offering **affordable, home-cooked meals** (commonly serve “comida corrida,” a set meal).
- **Mariscos (Seafood restaurants)** – Popular in coastal cities, serving **ceviche, shrimp tacos, and grilled fish**.
- **Taquerías** – Specialize in **different types of tacos, quesadillas, and tortas** (Mexican sandwiches).

Fine Dining & International Cuisine

- Mexico has a growing **gourmet dining scene**, especially in Mexico City, Guadalajara, Monterrey, and tourist areas like Riviera Maya and Puerto Vallarta.
- Many **Michelin-star chefs and award-winning restaurants** offer high-end Mexican fusion cuisine.

Dining Tips:

✓ **Tipping** – Generally **10-15%** at sit-down restaurants; not required for street food.

✓ **Meal Times** – Lunch (comida) is the **main meal**, eaten between **2:00–4:00 PM**. Dinner is often lighter and later in the evening.

✓ **Water Safety** – Avoid drinking tap water; always ask for **bottled or purified water** (“agua embotellada” or “agua purificada”).
