Problem 1: Living on a Building Site

The idea of living through a build is scary for many families. It brings mess, noise, and a loss of peace at home.



Constant Mess

Dust, debris, and building materials can quickly take over your living space, making daily life challenging.



Disruptive Noise

The sounds of construction, from hammering to drilling, can be relentless, impacting your family's quiet enjoyment.



Loss of Peace & Privacy

Renovations often mean tradespeople in your home, leading to a loss of privacy and a disrupted sense of peace.

The Reality of Living Through a Build



It'll Take Forever

Most projects take longer than you expect – a small extension can take 4 to 7 months instead of 3 or 4.

What You Can Do: Add 20–30% more time than your builder says, just to be safe.

It'll Be Too Stressful

Renovations can cause tension and worry at home.

What You Can Do: Set "no builder" hours so your family can relax. Good project management keeps communication clear and stress low.



It'll Be Unsafe or Dusty

Building work means dust, tools, and noise – not ideal for kids.

What You Can Do: Use air purifiers, seal off living spaces, and set up a quiet area for work or study away from the mess.

Tip

Good designers help families plan how to live through renovations more smoothly.



Problem 2: Finding People You Can Trust

Many homeowners worry about picking the wrong builder. Sadly, not all builders are properly checked or certified

Before You Hire Anyone, Make Sure To:

Check they have insurance and trade certificates.

Speak directly with recent customers.

Get a written contract with clear costs, dates, and payment stages.

Avoid builders who ask for all the money up front or give very low quotes.

Budget Planning

Money worries are one of the biggest reasons people delay home projects. The median UK renovation spend reached £21,440 in 2024 – a 26% increase from 2023 – but that often rises because of hidden issues, price changes, or poor planning.

Problem 3: Hidden Costs

Surprise costs are the biggest fear for homeowners. These often come from:

- Old houses needing extra work (like fixing walls or floors).
- New rules that mean extra upgrades to meet building standards.

Ask Yourself: Do you have enough saved for surprises?

53% of UK homeowners renovating in 2024 lived in pre-1940 homes, requiring significant system upgrades. With construction company insolvencies up 30% since 2019, choosing reliable contractors is more critical than ever.

Problem 4: Price Changes

Building materials often go up and down in price. Timber, steel, and other goods can rise quickly.

How to Protect Yourself:



Add a Price Buffer

Include 15–25% extra in your plan to cover price rises.



Buy Early

Secure key materials early to lock in prices (just be sure you can store them safely).



Stay Flexible

Ask your designer to plan a few material options so you can swap if prices change.

Step 3

Making It All Work

Rules & Timing

Many people delay projects because it feels too complicated. There are rules, forms, and lots of decisions to make.



Problem 5:

Dealing with the Rules

Planning permission and building regulations can be confusing. You may need approval before work begins, and you must name the right people to make sure your project is safe and legal.

If your project involves more than one contractor or needs building regulation approval, you'll need:

1. A CDM Principal Designer


Makes sure health and safety is covered before building starts.

2. A Building Regulations Principal Designer

Ensures all drawings and work follow the rules.

The numbers support this approach: 94% of UK homeowners hired professionals for their 2024 renovations, with electricians (59%) and plumbers (56%) being most commonly hired.

 **Important:** As the homeowner, you are still legally responsible for appointing the right people. Mistakes can lead to big fines.

This is why working with a professional designer is so important.



Problem 6: Lack of Time or Know-How

Busy families often struggle to find time or may not know all the steps. Big home projects usually take **10–15 months** from start to finish, and there are many choices to make along the way.

How to Save Time:

- Hire a designer who can handle the details for you.
- Plan ahead – good builders are often booked **6–12 months** in advance.
- Schedule work around the weather – outdoor work in spring/summer, indoor work in winter.
