I didn't come into this world fully understanding the depths of the truth that would surround me, shape me, and cause great harm. I found safety in my academic achievements. School became my refuge. At the age of 12, I earned a four-year scholarship to the Chicago Art Institute. School was my escape from the nightmare at home, and I excelled. By 19, I was one of the first African-American women to code using COBOL at CIGNA, where I was apprenticed in programming and broke barriers in technology.

But that didn't mean life was easy. I endured homelessness as a teen, and familial estrangement, all while navigating the complexities of a world that seemed intent on tearing me down. I've had to fight battles—many of them internal. I've had to battle rejection, heartache, the loss of my sister, Denice, my “Irish twin”, and even nowestrangement from two of my own adult children. I've experienced what it feels like to have the weight of the world knock my crown to the ground.

But I also know the power of God to restore that crown, to take what the enemy meant for evil and turn it into a story of resilience, strength, and purpose. For over 34 years, I have poured my heart and soul into ministry. I've served, preached, taught, and sung with every ounce of strength I have because I know what it feels like to be both lost and found—to feel the sting of being cast aside, only to have God call me by name and remind me of my royal inheritance.

I didn't write "Regal Resilience" to tell my story alone. I wrote it because we all have a crown to reclaim. Life is relentless. It will try to strip you of your identity, rob you of your worth, and make you believe that your scars disqualify you from royalty. But I'm here to tell you that those scars are part of your crown. They're proof that you survived the fire and emerged stronger, refined, and with a deeper understanding of your worth.

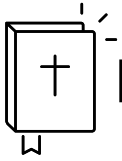

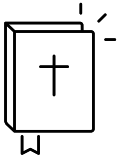

Key Lessons:

Just as a mother bird shelters her young under her wings, God offers us safety, shelter, and comfort. When we face uncertainty, hardship, or danger, we can find refuge in His presence. Ruth's decision to trust in the God of Israel brought her into His protective care, and it's the same for us today.

Yet, in her humility and faithfulness, God orchestrated a reward far greater than she could have ever imagined. Instead of allowing the circumstances to dictate your mindset, declare God's promises over your life. Say it out loud: "I am more than a conqueror through Christ Jesus" (Romans 8:37). The enemy wants you to focus on the storm, but God calls you to focus on the Savior who can calm the storm with a word.

Third, find strength in community. God did not design us to walk this journey alone. Surround yourself with other believers who will lift you up in prayer, encourage you with the Word, and stand with you in faith. When Moses grew weary in battle, it was Aaron and Hur who held up his arms, ensuring victory (Exodus 17:12). Let others be your Aaron and Hur when you feel weak..



Chapter 3: Overcoming Adversity with Grace

The Role of Resilience in Personal Growth

Resilience is not something you are born with; it is something that is cultivated, often in the furnace of adversity. It is the ability to bend without breaking, to press on when giving up seems easier, and to trust God even when you can't trace Him. 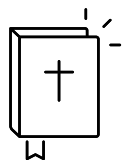

Bible Study

Case Study:

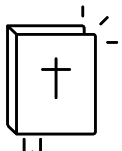

- Many of us are consumed with anxiety about the future, but this verse challenges us to trust God so fully that we can face tomorrow with joy, not fear. The Proverbs 31 woman demonstrates what it means to walk in faith, not fear, and her peace comes from knowing that God is her provider, protector, and guide.
- Wisdom and Faithful Instruction: The Proverbs 31 woman is wise, but her wisdom is not self-made. It comes from her deep relationship with God. "She speaks with wisdom, and faithful instruction is on her tongue." Her words carry weight because they are grounded in the truth of God's Word. She doesn't speak impulsively or carelessly, but rather with thoughtfulness and purpose. Chapter 6: Healing from Past Wounds

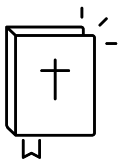

Bible Study: The Healing Power of God

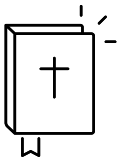
Key Lessons:

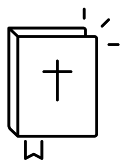

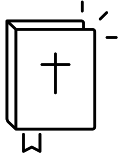


Actionable Steps:

Key Lessons:

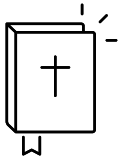

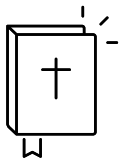
Key Lessons:

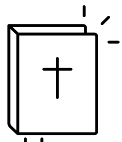

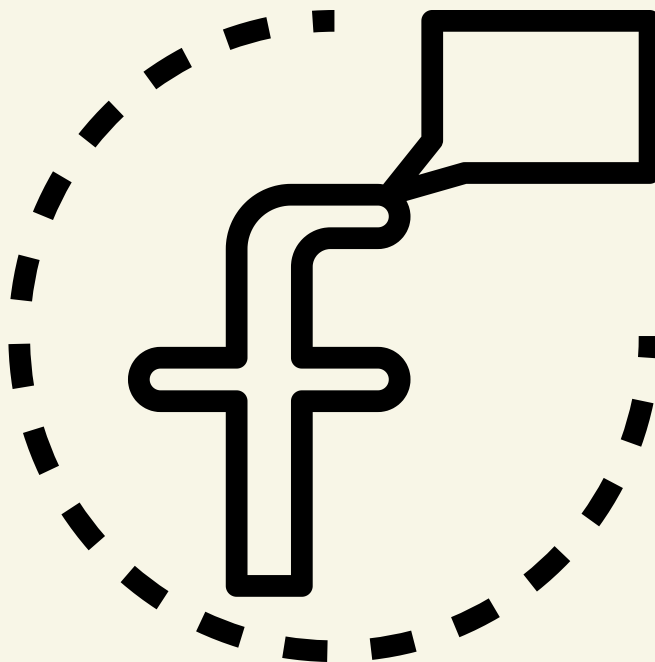
