Funeral of the late Gregory Marc Nicie

Greg Nicie's funeral was held on Wednesday 13 August at the Jones and Company's Hillsdene Chapel, where ten people attended from the Tauranga Art Society.

President Debbie Clarke was away overseas but had previously circulated to the membership a tribute outlining Greg's amazing contribution to Tauranga Society of Artists in his admirable quiet manner. Debbie's tribute was printed in full on Greg's service sheet. Wendy Fullerton spoke on behalf of the Society.

It was a small intimate gathering of around sixty people, with Greg's mother, two sisters, brother and their families in attendance, some coming from as far as Blenheim. Greg's daughter Camela who lives in Australia sent a heartfelt message that was read to the congregation. She was able to visit Greg last year, presenting his first grandson Jasper to him, which he was extremely proud of. On the eve of Greg's funeral, she gave birth to another son and Greg's second grandson, whom she named after him.

Part of the service allowed others to get up and speak and the family recounted fond memories of his humour, and quiet and generous nature. Not only was his talent for his art mentioned several times but his achievement as a black belt, too. His Parkinson's diagnosis around four years ago didn't deter Greg from helping others and continuing to paint for as long as possible.

A lovely afternoon tea was held for all in attendance while a private cremation took place. – Wendy Fullerton



September Expo 2025

With less than four weeks to go now till our September Expo, the clock is ticking for you to get your artworks completed, labelled with their swing tags and packed ready to go. Please remember to put your artist registration number and the letter of the artwork (from your registration form) on your swing tags. Artworks must have your name written on the back of the artwork as well, in case the swing tag gets detached.

Fine art prints need to have a backing board and be wrapped in cellophane. They need the same labelling on the back of the packaging as you would put on a swing tag. Cards need to have envelopes and to be packaged in cellophane with the artist's initials and price on a sticker on the back of the packaging. Remember there can be no changes to your registrations once you have sent them in.

Now we are working on the roster for the two Set Up days and the roster for the four days that we are open to the public. We are all volunteers and everyone who exhibits must do a roster shift. This time, on the open days, we are only having two shifts a day. Morning Shift: 8.45am – 12.30pm. Afternoon Shift: 12.30pm – 5.15pm. If you are not exhibiting but you are available to help on the Set Up days, please email membership@taurangaart.com or text me on 021909807.

The days are Tuesday 23 September at 1pm – Set up screens, lights, gazebos, tables.

Wednesday 24 September at 8am – Check in, hanging and labelling of art.

Pastels are a very immediate medium and retain their freshness over time.

I have found pastels to be a challenging medium requiring specific paper grounds, pastel sticks, 'medium' products and finally the necessity to both frame and glaze any finished artwork.

Some or all of the above can be daunting and it has taken me some time to acquire the right pastels, try and find a paper ground that I prefer and am still learning about the 'medium' products that are now available.

I have tried many paper types, with varying degrees of satisfaction, but enjoying the differences each one offers by way of finish is part of their charm.

The pastel sticks themselves come in different shapes and brands. Learning which pastel type (soft or hard) to use comes with trialing them.

Using pastels opens up the opportunity to try any subject as a potential painting due to their versatility.

Library News

Hi Everyone,

I have been reading an interesting book on Egyptology and mythology. Ancient Egyptians used art and hieroglyphics to assist the deceased to the afterlife. There was usually a door painted inside the coffin and drawings of food, meat utensils and other implements that would help in the afterlife.

When Egyptologists opened the tombs and casks with mummified bodies, the colours of the paintings were as clear as when they had been inscribed thousands of years ago.

Each colour had a symbolism. Egyptians used a variety of pigments like ochre, lead antimonite yellow, Egyptian green and various earth pigments for red and yellow.

The first synthetic colour was Egyptian Blue made by heating quartz, sand, copper, lime and an alkali over 5000 years ago.

Egyptian Blue is now used for medical imaging, security ink and fingerprint detection.

We have a book in the library, A Picture History of Art by Christopher Lloyd (76), depicting many detailed examples of Egyptian carvings and drawings.
