Disaster Scenario: Travelling the island of Tasmania during a freak storm

Age Level: 8+ years

Life Cycle:2 (LC.2)

Setting: Hobart, Tasmania, Australia

Disaster: Extreme Storm

Scenario:

It's a stormy night in the remote Australian island of Tasmania. Ashley and her family are visiting Tassie, for aurora Australis, landmarks and local attractions. They're having an adventure of a lifetime, hiking through the rugged landscape, discovering ancient art, and admiring the breathtaking views of the aurora's.

Suddenly, distant dark clouds roll in. The storm is moving fast, fanned by strong winds and dark grey clouds, the storm looks to hit them with a heavy downpour.

Within minutes, the storm has arrived and the family return to their car, and start to travel slowly to the nearby emergency point.

Disaster Scenario:



Disaster Scenario: Travelling the island of Tasmania during a freak storm

Panic sets in as the storm hits hard on the car. Huge hail stones crashed on the surface of the windows and panels of the vehicle. The family knows they need to get to the emergency point as quickly as possible, but given the weather, they had to take it slow and cautiously on the road.

Response:

With their hearts pounding in their chests, Ashley and her family reach the emergency point they had learned of before heading out that day. They grab their belongings from the car, which were packed with essential supplies like water, food, a first aid kit, and a map, and rushed to the building.

As they approach the emergency point, the hail stones gain in size and begin to pound on them as they make their way to the brick building on the hill. While the emergency point was only meters from their car, in that time it took to make their way up, they got completely hail stone hammered, and drenched.

Ashley's mother had prepared as much as she could before going out that day. She checked the forecast and packed a life saver kit with first aid, food and H2O. She also suggested for everyone to wear water proof winter gear that morning, just in case the storm was bigger than forecasted. It was a good thing they did!

Disaster Scenario:



Emergency:

As they reach the emergency point, they find it swarming with other tourists and locals who have also been caught in the storm. Blankets, tea and coffee are being handed out for those who got wet, to get warm as quickly as possible.

Ashley's family stepped inside and were instantly greeted by a group of volunteers offering their time to help anyone, caught in the storm.

Aftermath:

The family was relieved to make it there, unharmed. They spent the night in the building. Makeshift stretcher beds were assembled in rows across one side of the room, and a hot meal was offered for those in need by the kitchen. The next morning, when they went outside they saw the road was flooded with water and their car damaged by the hail stones. After several hours, the water subsided and everyone left.

Learning Points:

1. Always be aware of your surroundings and potential hazards when travelling...
2. Educate yourself about emergency plans and procedures.
3. Pack essential supplies in a backpack that you can carry easily.
4. Stay calm and follow instructions in the event of an emergency.
5. Be prepared to make quick decisions and think creatively to ensure your safety.

Activity: Consider the scenario, and think about what more you could have done to better your chances "if" a similar scenario was to occur. While we hope and plan for safe and drama free experiences, planning ahead for situations like these, provides the best chances to be better equipped, should an emergency occur.

1. Alphabet Game

Start with the letter 'A' and take turns naming things you see in the car or out the window that begin with that letter. Continue through the alphabet, challenging each other to come up with unique words.

2. Number Guessing Game

One person chooses a number between 1 and 100 and keeps it a secret. The other players guess the number by asking questions, such as 'Is it greater than 50?' or 'Is it an odd number?' The first player to correctly guess the number wins.

3. Road Sign Charades

This is a fun twist on the classic game. Use road signs as inspiration for charades. One person chooses a road sign and acts out the meaning without speaking. The other players guess the sign based on their performance.

4. Road Trip Scavenger Hunt

Prepare a list of items or landmarks that players need to spot along the way. The first player to find all the items on their list wins. Create a list of different animals that could be spotted in Tasmania. As you drive or hike, keep an eye out for the animals on the list. Award points for each animal they find. Highest points wins, or first to an agreed amount (example:10), wins.
