Case Study 1 – Cheshire Police

The case was repeatedly dismissed as “too hard to prove”, with one officer even stating:
“If he is truly a bad guy, he will do something.”

After months of minimisation, a new officer reviewed the case. Once the TITRA timeline was presented, the response completely changed; they decided to arrest and interview the suspect.

The officer admitted that TITRA “made it easier to see a pattern,” and the victim herself recognised that without it, the case would likely have continued to be dismissed.

Case Study 2 – GMP

This was not only a high-risk case, but a repeat offence: the suspect had already received a suspended sentence for assaulting the victim. When further stalking and threats to kill were reported, the case was fobbed off and minimised for over 3 months.

Even my professional concerns – and the initial TITRA, were ignored until, through perseverance, the case finally reached an officer with professional curiosity. Once TITRA was put in front of her, she saw it as help, not a hindrance.

Her words:

“This is like a statement in itself. I just need to expand on certain areas.”

Exactly how TITRA is designed to be used. The result? Arrest made, case finally moving forward.

Case Study 3 – Staffordshire Police / CPS

In another high-risk case, CPS were dismissing serious risk factors and painting the victim as unreliable and volatile. Staffordshire Police formally requested that I review and clarify concerns.

The TITRA, along with my expert report, was submitted as formal evidence to CPS. The outcome? Five charges authorised – after the system had spent over three years dancing around a high-risk offender.

Even though professionals had accumulated case notes, the TITRA presented the evidence more clearly, removing confusion.

My expert report added the trauma-informed lens CPS were seeking – but imagine if every professional had that lens from the start.

Case Study 3 – Cheshire Police

In this case, the victim did not initially realise that what she had experienced was a sexual offence. Her account had been minimised, and the broader pattern of coercive control overlooked.

With my support and the TITRA completed, everything changed. The timeline demonstrated the pattern of coercive control supporting the rape investigation, and the case was presented in a structured, professional format.

The outcome? An arrest for rape.

Just as crucially, the victim herself gained clarity and validation. Where she had previously internalised and diluted her experience, TITRA helped her recognise the seriousness of what she had endured.



Proven Impact

I don't step in directly on many cases; I simply don't have the time. And when I do, it's when I recognise the risk is too high to allow police to keep silencing the victim.

But here's the pattern: every single case I have stepped in on since creating the TITRA has led to a result.

That's not by chance.

That's the power of structured evidence and a trauma-informed lens.
