# Prepare Your *Little One*

To prepare your child for preschool, start by talking about what preschool is and what they can expect. Trust the teachers to handle the transition and avoid lingering or returning for another goodbye. Celebrate small successes and gradual adjustments to help your child feel more comfortable.
