Progressive Era A period of social activism and political reform in the United States, roughly from the 1890s to the 1920s, aimed at addressing problems caused by industrialization, urbanization, and political corruption.

State Bar of Arizona The professional organization that regulates the practice of law in Arizona, responsible for licensing attorneys, setting ethical standards, and disciplining lawyers who violate those standards.
