- -ing (present participle): running (the act of run)

- -ness (state or quality): happiness (state of being happy)
- -ly** (in a manner): quickly (in a quick manner)

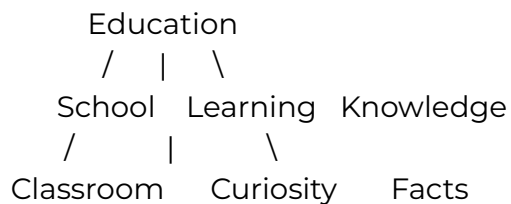
