Research the Right Scholarships

Common Scholarships

- **Local Scholarships:** Reach out to local community organizations (Rotary Clubs, local businesses, your school district) for scholarships that may have less competition.
- **Niche Scholarships:** Apply for scholarships that cater to your unique characteristics (first-generation college student, minority scholarships, scholarships for specific fields like STEM, arts, etc.).
- **Online Search Tools:** Use dedicated scholarship search engines like:
 - **Fastweb:** Comprehensive with thousands of scholarships.
 - **Cappex:** Combines scholarships and college admission tools.
 - **Niche.com:** Offers search filters for specific interests and backgrounds.



Government & Organization Scholarships:

- **FAFSA:** File the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as early as possible. This is a gateway for need-based scholarships.
- **Gates Millennium Scholars:** Offers full funding for minority students with financial need.
- **QuestBridge:** Matches low-income high-achieving students with full-ride scholarships to top colleges.

Academic Performance

- **GPA:** Most full-ride scholarships require a minimum GPA of 3.5 or higher. Aim for rigorous courses like AP, IB, or Honors to demonstrate academic dedication.
- **Test Scores:** Prepare for the SAT/ACT as high scores unlock merit-based scholarships. Use free resources like Khan Academy or consider a test-prep course.
- **Set Goals:** If a scholarship requires a 3.7 GPA and 1400 SAT, plan to meet or exceed these. Consider retaking tests if necessary.

Extracurricular Activities:

- **Quality Over Quantity:** Focus on a few activities where you can demonstrate significant commitment and leadership. For example, serving as president of your school's community service club or founding an initiative will stand out more than being a passive member of 10 clubs.
- **Show Impact:** Scholarship committees look for measurable results. Rather than listing "Volunteer at a food bank," say, "Led a team to organize monthly food drives, providing meals to over 500 families."



Secure Strong Letters of Recommendation



These are a **MUST-HAVE**

- **Choose Wisely:** Ask teachers, coaches, or leaders who know you well and can speak to your strengths and character.
- **Help Your Recommenders:** Provide them with a resume or brag sheet to make writing personalized letters easier.
- **Ask Early:** Request letters at least a month before the deadline, and send reminders if necessary.



PERFECT YOUR ESSAYS

Write with Purpose: Scholarship essays are your chance to showcase who you are beyond your grades so use your story to demonstrate resilience, leadership, and ambition.

Be Personal: Avoid generic phrases like “I want to change the world.” Share specific, personal experiences that describe a challenge you overcame

Tailor Each Essay: Don’t use a one-size-fits-all essay for every scholarship. Adjust your essays to align with the scholarship's goals. For example, leadership-focused scholarship should highlight your leadership roles.

Response Approach: Share a specific story—don’t just say you were a leader, but illustrate the obstacles you faced, how you managed the situation, and the tangible impact of your leadership.

Get Feedback: Have teachers, family members, or mentors review your essays. Look for content (Are you telling a compelling story?) and clarity (Is your writing concise and error-free?).

Real Tip: Use the STAR method in your essay: **Situation, Task, Action, Result**—this helps structure your story effectively.
